

Times May Seek Great Joint Loan In United States

Collapse of Foreign Exchanges Causing Feeling of Panic in Europe: Experts Urge Economy

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Suggestions are being made to-day that the European allies may soon take joint action toward securing a large credit in the United States which has been revealed in French financial circles over the decline of the franc is asking itself when the possibility of pre-war standards is going to end.

DEALERS reported an exceptionally large demand for bankers' acceptances yesterday.

The bidding for bills was so active that dealers generally now have bare portfolios. The improvement came simultaneously with a quickening of activity in the bond market. The third instalment of Federal taxes became due at the beginning of this week, and the banks are therefore in possession of large sums of money which have not yet percolated back into industry. Even when the acceptance market was less active the supply of bills was running behind the demand. No increase in the flow of acceptances into the market has been observed.

In the commercial paper market the inquiry for bills is also large, and the market continues to broaden slightly. The best paper is taken at 5 per cent, but most of the bills are quoted at 5 1/2 per cent. The paper of borrowers whose names are not well known brings 5 1/2 per cent.

TEXTILES—Better Buying by Elimination of Speculator

The gradual curtailment of speculative operations in cotton goods has brought about a period of healthy buying. Many mill agents and commission houses are determined to prevent if possible further acquisition of goods by speculators. It is not believed, however, that speculators will pay 1 1/2 cents a yard, yesterday's quotation, for a standard gray cloth.

Commission houses are instructing their clients to sell colored goods and to hold on to the established wholesale firms. This is being done not only in an effort to prevent speculation in these fabrics, but to provide the regular customers with merchandise badly needed. The cutting-up trade, which chiefly embraces garment manufacturers, are finding it difficult to buy many lines of colored goods, especially garbages, as the commission houses argue that such buyers cannot be regarded as steady customers, saying that their purchases are always made from the source of supply.

Adverse Exchange Checks Sale of American Shoes

British Dealers Still Purchasing Here, but Are Paring Down Orders to a Minimum Owing to Low Value of the Pound in United States Money

The decline of the English pound in terms of American dollars is rapidly curtailing the exportation of American leather and shoes to Great Britain, although purchases are still being made in this country. Among the latest British buyers for American made shoes is the firm of Lilley & Skinner, Ltd., of London, who are large chain store retailers as well as wholesalers. E. H. Palmer, director of the firm, and J. R. Palmer, buyer, have arrived in this country for a tour and prospective purchasing trip through American and Canadian shoe factories.

The adverse exchange rates will limit our purchases of goods, said Mr. Skinner yesterday, "but we hope to place some orders here. Leather is scarce in England and the production of shoes is scarcely more than 75 per cent of normal and nowhere near the requirements of British trade. We must seek shoes wherever we can. Instead of purchasing in lots of 5,000 pairs, we are now buying in quantities of 25 to 50 pairs. Our orders will be small and our orders to 500 pairs of shoes.


