

Vote on Treaty Nov. 12 Put Up To Democrats

Republicans, Catching Hitchcock Napping, Offer Unanimous Consent Agreement Fixing Date

Administration Leader Offers to Limit Debate, but Sets No Time for Ballot

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—A final vote may be taken on the peace treaty with Germany in the Senate by the night of November 12, unless Administration Senators object to a proposal made today by the Republicans.

Counter Proposal Made

Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, leader of the Administration forces in the Senate, who had been insisting that the opponents of the treaty make an agreement to hurry the final vote, was caught napping while the Senate was debating amendments today, and the entire responsibility for delaying a vote beyond a week from next Wednesday was placed upon his shoulders.

Administration Leader Offers to Limit Debate, but Sets No Time for Ballot

The Administration leader then offered a counter proposal merely limiting debate on each reservation, amendment, resolution or any of the preliminary motions that might be made during the remainder of the Senate's consideration of the treaty to fifteen minutes, but fixing no date for a final vote.

Lodge Doubtful of Agreement

Both of the counter proposals were voted over until Monday, Senator Lodge said tonight he would not call up his proposal for action until he has further consulted with his colleagues. Senator Lodge tonight expressed the opinion that Senator Hitchcock, by offering a substitute agreement, already has objected to the Lodge motion and that the agreement cannot be made.

Hitchcock Seeks Delay

"Then," said Senator Fall, "I would make this suggestion to the Senator. If he can agree to a date, the preparation of the request can be easily enough made. Then I would ask the Senator whether it would be agreeable to him that the Senate, if it chooses first to do so, should agree to final vote upon this treaty and all matters pending by November 12."

Hitchcock Seeks Delay

"I think the best plan," Senator Hitchcock said, "would be for the Senate to create a committee to examine the treaty, so that we can examine it. We do not know how many amendments may be offered, how many resolutions may be offered, how many resolutions of ratification may be offered."

Hitchcock Seeks Delay

"My suggestion," said Senator Fall, "is that we definitely dispose of all reservations and amendments now pending and to be offered and the resolution of ratification on or before November 10. If the Senator will agree in principle I have no doubt we can agree on a limitation of debate."

300,000 Army Strong Enough, Says Pershing

General, Setting Figure as Limit, Also Disagrees With War Department on Universal Training

Urges Six Months' Service

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Dissenting in many important respects from the program recommended by the War Department and the general staff, General Pershing told the military committee of Congress today that 300,000 men, raised entirely by voluntary enlistment, should be the outside figure considered for a standing army.

Commander Objects to General Staff Projecting Control Into Details of Line

He favored universal military training to provide an emergency reserve, but thought general educational work should be combined with it and military discipline "somewhat relaxed" so the system would be in complete harmony with democratic institutions. He fixed six months as the training period.

Two Reservations Submitted

Senator Borah, one of the group of "reservationists," today submitted two reservations to the treaty. One on Article X and the other disapproving of the disposition of Egypt in the document.
