

Mercier, Hero Cardinal, Bids U. S. Farewell

Prelate Sails for Liverpool After Brief Quebec Visit; Sends Cordial Message to People of United States

Regrets Missing President Blessing Bestowed Upon Nation for Its Generous Response to His Appeal

QUEBEC, Nov. 1.—Cardinal Mercier boarded the steamship *Meganitic* for Liverpool to-day after being given a civic reception. He was the guest of Cardinal Bégin during his stay here. Cardinal Mercier sent the following farewell message to the people of the United States:

"It is difficult for me to give adequate expression to my feelings at this moment, when I am about to leave your wonderful and hospitable land. The sympathy and love with which I have been received everywhere, both in large cities and the lesser ones, and even at small stations by the way, have gone to my heart. I can say with full truth that the moral comfort which you have brought to my soul has indeed rejuvenated me and given me new strength and vigor with which to face whatever duties the Divine Providence may entrust to me to accomplish in my dear Belgium."

"I have learned to admire the American people; I have learned to love them. I feel a strong assurance that a lasting tie of mutual sympathy and confidence has been established between your country and mine, and that it will endure for generations to come. If the calamities of this great war and the bitter sufferings which it entailed for our peoples have brought it one bright thought, it is of this bond of union between us. I realize and firmly believe that Americans also realize that it has been a privilege for our generation to go through the crucible of this gigantic struggle. For those who would be exalted spiritually and morally by its lessons it is an opportunity such as has never been given at any other time of the world's existence."

"By these lessons which can be sought, and I may say which stand out in bold letters on every page of the annals of the war, I mean the magnificent instances of individual and national sacrifice and self-denial, objects of the highest moral order, in and by which each one of us may make his rule of life in the future."

"I know more my dear American friends, let me express to you my heartfelt thanks for the wonderful assistance which you gave to Belgium during the war."

"Let me again thank you for the generous way in which you have responded and are responding to my appeal to help me once more in the heavy tasks of those who would recover the effects of radical Socialism and Bolshevism, in reestablishing trade and industrial schools, etc., which await me at home, tasks which are related closely not only to the welfare, but to the very existence of my people, even though they themselves in this period of unrest and resentment may not fully realize it."

"The world, I know, seems to have these difficult and unsettling problems before it everywhere. And yet I have the profound conviction that just as right prevailed in this awful conflict just ended, so justice and right will, when given their hearing, solve these problems of unrest and measurably reconcile the differences of man. It is my duty, I know, to write to this end. I pray you, my dear friends, do likewise."

"I had hoped before leaving, to be received by your President, Mr. Woodrow Wilson. To my regret this has been impossible owing to the present state of his health. I express my sincerest wishes and prayers for his prompt and complete recovery."

"Let me, in conclusion, my dear people, assure you that you will ever be present in my memory and in my prayers, and give me the privilege of bestowing my blessing on you with all my heart."

VLADIVOSTOK, Nov. 1 (By The Associated Press).—A train with part of a consignment of 68,000 rifles recently shipped from America for Admiral Kolchak, was held up at Tehita, Trans-Baikal, on October 24, by General Semenov, the anti-Bolshevik leader in Siberia. General Semenov demanded that 15,000 rifles be delivered to him by 11 o'clock on the morning of October 25, or force would be used to obtain them.

The lieutenant commanding the train guard of 50 Americans, communicated with Major General William S. Graves, commander of the American expeditionary forces in Siberia, and was ordered under no conditions to turn over the rifles.

Although no word has been received at American headquarters at Vladivostok regarding events at Tehita since Semenov's time limit expired, Japanese headquarters last night notified General Graves that advances from

War Department Takes Over Camp Welfare Service

Assumes Charge of 593 Y. M. C. A. Huts Worth \$4,500,000 and Work of Kindred Organizations

Welfare work in all army camps in the United States was taken over yesterday by the War Department, which will carry on the former activities of the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Welfare Board and the American Library Association.

Arrangements for the retention of the buildings constructed by the voluntary welfare organizations during the war and for the continuance of the work of these agencies have not yet been worked out. The latter are, however, cooperating with the War Department by continuing their work and turning over their men to the government wherever requested. This will be done in most cases until the war plans division of the General Staff forms the contemplated new welfare organization.

The Knights of Columbus committee on war activities, meeting at the Hotel Commodore yesterday, issued the following statement regarding the withdrawal of the war relief agencies from home camps:

"The Knights of Columbus protested against the War Department's order to withdraw all war work agencies in home camps by November 1. But at the time we made our protest we stated that we would of course obey the War Department's orders. We have not changed our attitude, neither have we changed our opinion that relief work of the nature conducted by the Knights of Columbus in the camps is more efficiently conducted by civilian than by military agency, and it is an estab-
