
Engagement Announcements in Society Show Cupid is Busy

Filipino Demand For U. S. Clothes Has Raised Costs

Party Dresses Are Sent From New York to Appease Calls of Natives for the Latest Thing in Fashion's Decree

CHESTER, Pa., Nov. 29.—The cost of living has bounded in the Philippine Islands and is still on the rise. Many reasons are given by Bernard Jardeleza, recently arrived from the province of Iloilo, Island of Panay, to take a course in civil engineering under the direction of the War Department at Pennsylvania Military College.

"Uncle Samuel has issued a decree that all of his little brown nephews in the Western practice of wearing trousers. This order includes the members of the most savage tribes in the mountain regions, who for centuries have held in lofty contempt anything resembling pants-wearing, nothing more conspicuous than the breechcloth, or nothing at all," he says.

"Filipinos of the younger generation, both men and women, have acquired the American craze for clothes. Party gowns and dress suits made in New York, Chicago and Philadelphia are in great demand in Manila and lesser towns and cities of the Philippine Archipelago. Canes, orange-tinted gloves and bone-rimmed eyeglasses are going wonderfully popular among the 'young bloods.'"

"Cheap automobiles, player pianos, talking machines and electric washers are being dumped by the shiploads in the Philippines, and Mr. and Mrs. Filipino desire these things just as keenly as do Mr. and Mrs. American.

"The world-wide food shortage has placed a tremendous demand upon the cane field, the rice plantations and the pineapple farms of the islands, boosting up food prices there."

Family of 6 in Distress Charity Society Takes Place of Wage Earner in Widow's Home

But they had not counted on several months' illness and the death of the head of the family, which used the savings. Mrs. L. is not strong and it is evident that the best service she can give her little ones is to continue the care she has been giving.

So the Charity Organization Society takes the place of wage earner for this home, and is trying to raise \$720 to support it for the next year.
