

Yale Club Team Takes Big Lead in Series for Class B Metropolitan Squash Title

Old Eli Players Defeat Princeton in Easy Fashion

Tigers Take Only One of Five Matches and Drop to Tie for Second Place; Crescent A. C. Humbles Columbia Club's Representatives

The Yale Club added to its unbroken string of victories yesterday in the Class B Metropolitan interclub squash tennis league championship series by defeating the members of the Princeton Club by a total of 4 matches to 1, on the Yale courts. This leaves Yale at the head of the league, with four matches won and none lost. The Crescent Athletic Club, of Brooklyn, and the Harvard Club are tied for second place, each having won and lost two. Princeton is in third place and Columbia last, with three defeats scored against her and one victory to her credit.

Carpentier May Try for Seat in French Chamber

PARIS, Dec. 18.—It is reported that Georges Carpentier, European heavyweight champion, will be a candidate for the seat in the Chamber of Deputies caused by the resignation of Captain Vernier. Carpentier was born in the North of France, and lived there for several years. Columbia Withholds Letter From Catcher On Varsity Nine

Because he deserted the team in mid-season, John Ackerman, catcher and first baseman on the Columbia varsity baseball nine last spring, was denied the right to a varsity letter by the insignia committee, which met yesterday. Ackerman's record entitled him to the honor in so far as the quality of his playing was concerned, but because he would not finish the season the committee decided that he should not get his letter. Awards were made to other members of the 1919 baseball team and to the members of the freshmen football and cross-country teams.

Kellock Averts Shutout

Harold Kellock, of Columbia, defeated H. W. Dangler, of the Crescent A. C., by a score of 10-15, 15-9, 15-10, and it was the only match in which the local university clubmen scored, for the Half Moon players showed in front in the other four matches. Dangler got away to a better start than his opponent and was playing so well that it seemed the match would go to him in straight games. But Kellock improved as the struggle waged, and in the last two games proved his superiority in an uncertain manner. He appeared to have a superior command of stroke and his judgment in mixing up his pace was a material factor in bringing him the victory.

Columbia Refuses To Play Stevens Again Next Season

Stevens Tech has practically completed its football schedule for next season. A few pending dates are to be closed. The undefeated Hoboken eleven will take on heavier teams in 1920 and will drop three or four of the lighter outfits. The Stevens team had offers from Princeton, Dartmouth, Syracuse, Lafayette and Holy Cross for next fall, but because of the inconvenient dates, asked none of these teams were hooked. Cornell, Brown, Pennsylvania Military College and Delaware are on the schedule, and most of these games will be played at Hoboken. Of the teams played the last season Rensselaer, N. Y., Worcester and Haverford will reappear on the Stevens schedule next year. Columbia absolutely refuses to meet Stevens in 1920. For the last few years the Columbia-Stevens game has been staged regularly on Election Day, but Columbia refused this date next year and several others offered by manager Barker.

N. Y. U. Five Meets Lafayette To-night: Jim Storey Hurt

Now York University's basketball team will open its home season tonight in the University Heights gymnasium, when it meets Lafayette from Lafayette College. The local five completed its training for this contest with a light workout yesterday afternoon, and, with the exception of Captain Jim Storey, are in excellent condition. Storey strained the ligaments in his left hip in the Columbia game last Saturday and was forced to retire from the contest at half time. He has been taking it easy this week, however, and expects to start against the Pennsylvania colts this evening. Should Storey remain out of the line-up to-night, Goeller will move up to his leader's place at left forward and Goeller will fill Goeller's post at right guard. Canham, the Violet's star all-around athlete, will hold down his old job at right forward, and Mooney will again be seen at the pivot position.

Platt and Riggs Win In Handicap Tournament

Matty in Line As New Leader Of the Giants

McGraw and Jennings Expected to Drop Managerial Reins After Next Season

John J. McGraw, manager of the Giants, and Hughie Jennings, manager of the Detroit Tigers, are bending every energy toward winning pennants in their respective leagues in 1920. It is very probable that both will have laid aside the uniform forever by the spring of 1921, and ever since Hughie took charge of Detroit in 1907 it has been the greatest ambition of these old-time friends of the famous Orioles to match their managerial wits in a world's championship series. Since Jennings began a brilliant career as leader of the Tigers thirteen seasons ago he has figured in three world's championship titles. In that time McGraw's teams have won four National League pennants. But it has never happened that the two clubs won the same season, and both the old friends in that time have lost every world's series start.

Ban's Connection With Indians to Be Learned To-day

The hearing of the owners of the Cleveland baseball club, to show the connection of Ban Johnson, president of the American League, with that organization, will open to-day in Part I of the Supreme Court in this city before Justice Lydon. It is alleged that Johnson owns stock in the Cleveland club to the extent of \$50,000. The defense of the American League head is that this money was only a loan to the Cleveland club. The genial colonel is going down below the Mason-Dixon Line to forget baseball war and its horrors and to get into condition by hunting and fishing for the strife next season.

Florio, of Paulist A. C., Wins From Chankin

Nick Florio, the Paulist Athletic Club boxer, secured a clean-cut victory over James Chankin, Mercury Athletic Club, in a special bout at 145 pounds which featured the final contests of the amateur boxing tourney at the Crescent Athletic Club, Brooklyn, last night. Florio pressed the issue throughout, and his harder blows, which he landed cleanly, stung his rival often. Chankin rallied in the third and last round, but was unable to overcome Florio's advantage. In the 120-pound division the spectators were treated to a surprise when William Pomerantz, Pastime Athletic Club, received the referee's decision over Harry Goldberg, a clubmate after the judges had disagreed as to the victor.
