## Household Economics Stressed at Exposition

Household economics will play an important part in the "Own Your Home" Exposition, scheduled to take place from May 1 to May 8 next at the Grand Central Palace. Mrs. A. Visitors to the exposition will be shown how the servant may be supplied by mechanical equipment, making drudgery unnecessary.

The entire mezzanine floor of Grand Central Palace has been set aside for this exhibit, which, in addition to exhibiting labor-saving devices and food products, also will include furniture, interior decorating, carpets, rugs, floor coverings, sewing machines, refrigerators, laundry equipment, bedding, linen, china, glassware, silverware, cutlery, etc.


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
