Wood Is Given Indorsement In Mississippi

Republican State Committee Declares for General; Action Is Taken to Insure Twelve Delegates

Author Adds Good Word

Hamlin Garland Approves Candidate as Representing Roosevelt Policies

Word was received yesterday at the Leonard Wood national campaign headquarters in this city that the state executive committee of Mississippi, presumably representing twelve national convention delegates, had indorsed the candidacy of General Wood at their meeting in Jackson Friday, M. J. Mulvihill is the national committeeman from that state.

John J. Lyons, one of the more prominent New York County district leaders, predicted at the National Republican Club yesterday the nomination and election of General Wood.

"The plain people of the country are more generally with General Wood than with any of the candidates aspiring to the Presidency," said Mr. Lyons. "In the old days the matter of a nomination was largely a matter of manipulation by the heads of large delegations. Things have changed. With the women voting in so many states the bosses now pay particular attention to the trend of public sentiment."

General Popular Favorite
"General Wood is the great popular favorite. His candidacy is going over some rough spots in the road, as indicated by The Tribune's special dispatches, but that experience is common to candidates who are leading the race so long before the convention. The undercurrent is for Wood, and what has happened to him in some of the states where his lines have been temporarily broken may happen to any candidate. He seems to be far in the lead and probably will stay there. The plain people of the country know him better than any of the candidates, and as there is much to be said in his favor and nothing of any account to be said against him, he has a big advantage over his competitors."

Former Representative Thomas W. Miller, assistant Eastern manager of the Leonard Wood campaign committee, before leaving for Washington today to confer with Senator Moses, the Southern manager, said General Wood has a big advantage because his candidacy is free from factionalism.

"From a party point of view he appeals to thousands because they believe he will unify all elements," said Mr. Miller. "He is a Republican who has not been allied with any party. In addition to this there is a feeling that his nomination will bring to the support of the Republican party thousands of young men who stay there. They first Presidential vote, and when youth, energy and loyalty would be a splendid asset for the future. These are the letters coming to the headquarters show, and in General Wood the embodiment of their ideals and he will be enthusiastically supported by them."

Hamlin Garland for Wood
Hamlin Garland, the author, in a letter to the Wood campaign managers, says he is for Wood.

"Among all of the men at present mentioned he is my first choice, both for himself and because he represents Roosevelt interests and policies," says Mr. Garland. "I wish I could talk with him some time on the labor situation. I have known him slightly for many years. As a matter of fact Roosevelt introduced me to him at the White House. Without surrendering an ounce of my patriotism I am asking the employer of labor to remember that the world is not the same as it was in 1914, and that there must be reasonable concessions to labor. Labor is asking for better conditions of living and is going to have them. On the other hand, I have no patience with the foreign agitator who is all for a 'proletariat dictatorship.' We need a man of General Wood's courage and experience to deal with the turbulent spirits who would bring upon us the madness and cruelty of Lenin."

R. M. Hurd, chairman of the American Defense Society, gives these reasons for supporting General Wood's candidacy:

"I am for Leonard Wood because I have confidence in his character and ability," he says. "He is the soul of loyalty to America, a believer in American institutions and ideals and the most far-sighted man in America in his preparedness to defend them. His record as an administrator in the Philippines and Cuba makes me confident that the business of the nation would be conducted on a sound basis."

Woman Suffrage Ratified By Nevada Legislature

Twenty-eighth State Approves Amendment; Eight More Indorsements Are Required

RENO, Nev., Feb. 7.—The Nevada Legislature in special session today ratified the Federal woman suffrage amendment, bringing the total of approving states to twenty-eight. Eight more legislative indorsements are required to make the amendment a part of the Constitution. Action by Arizona, New Mexico and New Jersey is expected soon.

The Nevada Senate passed the ratification bill unanimously. One adverse vote was cast in the Assembly. The legislative session lasted only one day. The twenty-seven states which have ratified are: Wisconsin, Michigan, Kansas, Ohio, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Texas, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, Montana, Nebraska, Minnesota, New Hampshire, Utah, California, Maine, North Dakota, South Dakota, Colorado, Kentucky, Rhode Island, Indiana, Wyoming and Oregon.

States which have ratified the suffrage amendment are Mississippi, Virginia and South Carolina.
