Q.—W. B. D.: I am married, but under
a deal of separation am living apart from
my wife, whose sole support is the allow-
ance I make her. Am I entitled to an ex-
emption from the payment of the tax on
my income?
A.—You are not entitled to an exemption
from the payment of the tax on your in-
come unless you are a dependent upon
some other person.

Q.—G. J.: I received last year in wages
\$3,000 and in interest \$2,000. I have
paid tax on \$5,000. Do I have to allow in
my tax on my board and room, and how
much?
A.—The fair value of your board and
room constitutes taxable income to you.
If you have paid tax on the \$5,000, you
may deduct the amount of the tax paid
from the \$5,000.

Q.—F. M.: Are the taxes on theater
tickets deductible from the Federal return
on income?
A.—Yes.

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946 New Influenza Cases
Pneumonia Also Showed In-
crease in Figures Given Out

Influenza and pneumonia cases showed
an increase here yesterday. For the
twenty-four-hour period ending at 10
o'clock, 946 cases of influenza and 102
cases of pneumonia were reported.
The total number of influenza cases
reported during the week ending Febru-
ary 13, 1920, was 5,412, an increase
of 412 above the number recorded in the
preceding forty-eight hours. Pneumonia
cases totaled 602, against 262 in the
preceding two days.
