Field Marshal's Candidacy Deceives No One and Only Monarchist Parties Taking Proposal Seriously

BERLIN, March 12.—After a few days' reflection on Hindenburg's proposed candidacy for President, the country appears to be wholly unmoved by it. The whole affair is interpreted everywhere as a clumsy maneuver of the two so-called Nationalist parties to utilize Hindenburg's military reputation for political purposes.

Outside of these parties Hindenburg's candidacy awakens regret, because it is felt that Hindenburg is sacrificing his position in which all the German people respect him to become the cat's paw of reactionaries.

to the board had given long and careful consideration to the general proposition, and that it had come to the conclusion that no direct arrangement should be made by the board with the German line, but that it is desirable and in the interest of our trade and an American merchant marine that an American company or companies should make an arrangement by which this business could be obtained and done under the American flag and that the board deems it desirable to cooperate in the accomplishment of this object by the sale or chartering of ships upon terms to be approved by it.

Desirable to Get Trade

"No concrete proposal was submitted or presented for the approval of the committee, but the board expressed the wish to have the benefit of the judgment of the committee upon the desirability of seeking to have these services taken over. On motion of Senator Randall it was declared the sense of the committee, by a vote of 10 to 4 (two members absent having authorized their votes to be recorded in the affirmative), that it is very desirable to get the advantage of the opportunity to take the trade of these services under the American flag, and that this should be done if it can be done under an satisfactory arrangement consistent with the general interests of the United States.

"In taking this action the committee gave the board to understand that it was simply expressing its opinion as to the desirability of getting this trade under the American flag, and the chairman of the board expressly stated that it was not the desire of the board that the committee should share in its responsibility in passing upon any concrete proposal that might be submitted or in working out the details and determining the terms of any arrangement that might be made."
