Society Women to Aid Y. W. C. A. in Campaign

Teams Are Formed to Help Raise \$1,500,000, Which Will Be Used to Provide Better Housing for Girls Coming to This City Daily

Women of society are rallying to the standard of the Young Women's Christian Association and will enter its drive to-morrow for \$1,500,000 which is being asked to provide more housing for girls and women in this city and extend the activities of the association in the broad field of women's welfare.

There will be a fete champetre for charity and with it a dog show, on June 5 on the grounds of the Morris County Golf Club, at Convent, N. J. All the county families will be represented, for the affair will practically inaugurate the season in that part of the country. The day will be given over to games of all kinds, pastimes, lawn fetes, hand concerts and dancing. It will be under the auspices of the Morris County People's Club, and a committee of town people and the Irish Terrier Club of America will cooperate with the Morris County Kennel Club in giving the bench show, which will be on a large scale.

2 Pre-Elizabethan Plays To Be Produced Again

Students of the pre-Elizabethan drama will be especially interested in the production of two rare old plays to be given with accurate historical settings at the Riverdale Country School, Riverdale-on-Hudson, on the afternoon of April 9 and the following evening. They are "Ye Morallite 'Mandrill'" and "Ye Miracle 'Ye Second Shepherd's Play,'" each representative of a distinct event of early English drama.

They will be acted upon a stage designed by Joseph Urban, and the settings and costumes are being prepared by Miss Mary McAndrew, in cooperation with Frank Lee Short, dramatic coach of the school. The proceeds will be shared with the Near East Relief Fund.
