

Whalen Abolishes Ferry Excursions

Acts to Prevent Underwood or Others Making Uninterrupted Bay Trip

Cover A. Whalen, Commissioner of Plant and Structures, took steps yesterday to forestall Frederick D. Underwood, president of the Erie Railroad, if he is contemplating taking any summer excursions on Staten Island ferriesboats this year.

Last year when Mr. Underwood felt in need of an outing he got on a ferryboat at South Ferry and refused to get off when the boat reached St. George. He was out for a ride, he said, and also out to prove that whatever rules the city might issue it could not prevent those who had bought tickets from riding, nor compel them to get off in the midst of their ride and hunt new seats amid a new throng of competitors. Mr. Underwood was arrested, but was discharged because, Commissioner Whalen said yesterday, the rule compelling passengers to leave a municipal ferryboat when it docked had not been advertised. Mr. Whalen made this statement in a repetition of the rule which he promulgated yesterday with instructions to file the rule with the City Clerk and publish it in "The City Record" in the hope that the next time Mr. Underwood was arrested it would take. He wants it also to serve as notice to all other municipal ferry passengers that they cannot make uninterrupted round trips.

The commissioner ordered an increase of four trips in the daily service of Staten Island ferriesboats to meet the growth in traffic. In 1919 there were 19,579,271 passengers, an increase of 2,017,470 over the number carried the preceding year.

Beggar With Bandaged Arm Gets \$26 an Hour

Sentenced to Prison for Trick Which Meant Annual Salary of \$69,000

"It's been a long time, your honor, since anybody has had nerve enough to pull this one."

The speaker was Patrolman William J. Foley, of Traffic Squad D, as he stood in the Flatbush police court yesterday making a charge of vagrancy against a man who said he was Arthur Harrison, twenty-six years old. Foley told Magistrate Steers that he found Harrison begging in the subway station at Pacific Street, Brooklyn, his right arm in splints and bandages. When Foley unwrapped the bandage he found the arm in perfect condition, he said.

"And he admitted," the patrolman continued, "that \$15 of the \$13.85 found on him had been given to him in half an hour."

"An eight-hour day at that rate would mean an annual salary of something like \$69,000," whispered an arithmetic sharp among the spectators.

"Six months in the penitentiary," said the court.

U. S. Agents Are Accused Of Abducting Wine Man

MIAMI, Fla., March 27.—Charles O'Connor, secretary of the Bimini Bay Rod and Gun Club, announced today the club would seek the prosecution of Merwin S. Bobst, special agent of the Department of Justice, and his three assistants, as a result of the removal of Charles Vincenti, a Baltimore wine merchant, from the island in the Bahamas which the club leases from the British government.

Mr. O'Connor said one of the charges to be lodged against the government agents would be that of kidnaping a peaceful citizen on British soil.

Vincenti is president of the Triaca Company of Baltimore, and is alleged to have been the head of a scheme to divert thousands of dollars worth of whisky from export for domestic sale. He is now en route to Baltimore in the custody of Internal Revenue Agent Arthur Johnson.

According to O'Connor, Bobst and his assistants went to Bimini Island in a boat last Thursday and forcibly removed Vincenti to this place, where he was arrested by Johnson.

Sets Up Incubator In Liner Stateroom

Brazilian Banker and Chicken Fancier Plans Hatching of Prize Eggs

Feliciano De Moraes, a wealthy Brazilian banker and chicken fancier, had a narrow escape yesterday from having his passage canceled when it was found that he had put an electrically heated incubator in his stateroom aboard the Lamport & Holt liner Tennyson. He had planned to hatch some of his prize eggs on the run down to Rio, rather than risk having them spoil in transit, but the steamship company would not permit him to convert his suite into an incubator.

Senhor Moraes protested, saying his ticket was a lease of the stateroom, and that he had a right to hatch eggs if he chose. He was informed that staterooms were for passengers to live and sleep in and were not intended for the use of animals or fowls or for hatching eggs.

The Brazilian's disappointment, however, was soothed shortly before the Tennyson sailed, when the skipper informed him that he would have the electrician rig up a connection for his incubator in the storeroom.

Senhor Moraes, who had come north from Rio to visit his son, a student at Cornell University, took back to Brazil fifty prize chickens and seventy rabbits.






