

Herron Captures Cuban Derby

Thrilling Race, Ending Season Blue Wrack Puts Up Game Fight, but Bows to Alvarez's Speedy Colt

From a Special Correspondent. HAVANA, March 28.—The long winter meeting of the Cuban-American Jockey Club came to a close today with the running of the \$10,000 Cuban Derby and amid the rousing cheers of more than 10,000 persons.

There was a short delay at the post and the field was sent away to the finish start. Mike Dazie was the quickest to get in motion, and Murray sent her into a long lead, while Garner, on Herron, and Pickens, on Blue Wrack, were content to wait.

Both colts were only galloping along and it appeared that they could go to the leader at any time. As the field swung into the stretch Garner made his bid to win, but he was easily headed by Herron and then took command.

But almost instantly Pickens sent Blue Wrack up and joined the leader. From the time she joined the leader a game finish has never been seen on the island. Both boys were riding desperately, neither one being able to gain an advantage, and it appeared that the race would end in a draw.
