ANTWERP, April 27.—The United States team had little difficulty in defeating the Swedes to-night by a score of 7 to 0.

The Americans had the game in hand all the way this evening and completely overwhelmed their opponents by their brilliant skating and hard-driving shots.

The Swedes put up a strong defensive game to-night. One of the features of the American play consisted of three remarkable long pitch goals made by George P. Geran, former Dartmouth College star, in succession in one minute of the first half.

The first half ended 5 to 0. The American team will complete Wednesday night against the Czechoslovaks for second place, the Canadians having already won the championship.

Milton, in Blazing Car. Breaks Another Record. DAYTONA, Fla., April 27.—With flames bursting from beneath the hood of his sixteen-cylinder automobile at the finish line, Tommy Milton to-day further reduced his own world's record for one and two miles.

The first mile was covered in 23.07 seconds, or at the rate of 156 miles an hour. The second mile was in 23.17 seconds, making the two miles in 46.24 seconds. Milton steered the car into the ocean after slowing down to draw out the flames.
