Wood Support Surprising The surprising features of to-day's primary to the Cleveland Republicans was the number of city wards that went for Wood. The vote was light, and thought to have been confined pretty completely to the minimum poll cast by the city organization, which was leading Harding's fight. In the city, however, Wood took a 3,500 lead over the Senator.

At Alliance heavy rains kept voters away from the polls in the forenoon, but a somewhat heavier vote was polled later in the day. A \$200,000 bond issue for a school building added interest. Light Vote in Akron Akron failed to turn out a big vote, notwithstanding the voters had \$1,000,000 bond issue for a hospital, \$700,000 for a city hall and several other minor items before them. A light vote was likewise reported from Springfield, a Harding stronghold, in spite of a \$1,000,000 schoolhouse bond issue.

Harding, 226.

Canadian Envoy Discussed LONDON, April 27.—The question of Canadian representation in Washington was raised in the House of Commons last night by Colonel Arthur Murray, coalition Liberal. Colonel Murray said that while he believed Canadians generally were favorable to the idea of sending an ambassador to the United States, many of them considered that the situation would be an anomalous one, as Canada as an independent country and the authority of her representative would be impaired if it were subordinate to that of the British ambassador.

50 Killed in Indian Wreck Fifty Injured in Railway Collision Near Delhi SIMLA, India, April 26 (Delayed).—Fifty persons were killed and fifty injured in a collision on the Gwah & Rohilkhand Railway near Moradabad, east of Delhi, Saturday. Four coaches were burned in a fire which resulted.

Every One in Bay State Town Ignores Primary

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., April 27.—The town of Florida, which is at the summit of the Mohawk Trail, and through which the famous Hoosac tunnel extends, did not cast a vote in to-day's primaries. The town clerk opened the Town Hall, but none of the citizens appeared to vote, and the clerk did not vote himself.

Hirshfield Issues Call For Straton as Witness

Pastor Arranges Postponement of Appearance in Vice Probe and Starts South Commissioner of Accounts David Hirshfield yesterday caused a subpoena to be served upon the Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton, calling for his appearance as a witness in the investigation into the New York vice conditions which the commissioner is conducting at the request of Mayor Hylan. The subpoena requested that Dr. Straton present himself at Commissioner Hirshfield's office to-day.

Father-in-Law Broke Up Home, Says Young Wife Testifies She Has Not Seen Husband Since 1918; Asks \$50,000 Mrs. Florence Waller, twenty years old, of East Rutherford, N. J., who is suing her father-in-law, William E. Waller, a merchant of Rutherford, for \$50,000 for the alleged alienation of her husband's affections, was the principal witness yesterday in the trial of her suit in the Bergen County Court, Hackensack.

Miners Fight Court of Industrial Relations PITTSBURGH, Kan., April 27.—The law which created the Kansas Court of Industrial Relations was put to a test today in the Kansas judicial machinery to-day. Opponents of the law, centered about Alexander Howat, leader of the Kansas union miners, this morning attacked the law as unconstitutional, when the injunction hearing in the case instituted by the state to prevent the calling of a mine strike came up before Judge Andrew J. Curran in the Crawford County District Court.

Wood and Sprout Speak at Grant Day Celebration PITTSBURGH, April 27.—Major General Wood, candidate for the Republican nomination for President, and Governor William C. Sprout of Pennsylvania were the principal speakers at the Grant day dinner of the American Club here to-night. General Wood responded to the toast "Grant" and Governor Sprout spoke on "Pennsylvania and the Nation while Senator Eldien P. Spencer, of Missouri, addressed the thousand or more guests on "The Republican Party and Patriotism."

Five Presidential Candidates Favor Farmers' Program

Lowden, Owen, Gerard, Hoover and Wood Approve Four Measures Which Are Subject of Questionnaire WASHINGTON, April 27.—Approval of cooperative bargaining, improved rural credits, reduction in the "knowing evil" of farm tenancy, and national conservation was voiced by Presidential candidates who have answered the recent political questionnaire of the National Board of Farm Organizations. Replies were made public to-day from Governor Lowden, Senator Owen, James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany; Herbert Hoover and Major General Leonard Wood. That from William G. Brooklyn Club for Wood

Straw Vote Shows Young Republicans Largely Favor Him Following a straw vote among its members which gave General Leonard Wood a long lead, the Brooklyn Young Republican Club has endorsed General Wood for the Republican nomination for President. Herbert Hoover comes second, but his vote is only one-fourth of that cast for General Wood, while Senator Hiram W. Johnson is third, with a vote of one-third of that cast for Hoover.

Kansas City Republicans Name Two Complete Delegations

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 27.—Separate sets of 132 delegates to the state Republican convention, to be held here May 5, were named by the organization and anti-organization forces at the Jackson County (Kansas City) Republican convention here to-day. A similar duplication developed in the name of two delegates to the national convention, both forces having sought to arrive at some collective judgment as to the fitness of the various candidates in both parties and then throw our support to them prior to and at the national conventions.

Sylvia Pankhurst Pledged To Aid Bolshevik Crusade

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Documents purporting to have been signed by Sylvia Pankhurst, the British suffrage leader, James Gordon and Clara Zetoff, promising assistance in spreading Bolshevik propaganda throughout the world, were found in possession of three Communist couriers arrested in Latvia, the State Department was advised to-day. The couriers, who were traveling by airplane from Rangoon to Bitesh, in Soviet Russia, were forced to land in the Baltic province.

Hundreds Reported Slain in Red Riots

Story of Revolution in Belgrade Doubled; General Strike in Laibach LONDON, April 27.—A Bolshevik revolution has broken out in Jugoslavia, says a Central News dispatch from Rome, quoting Trieste advices to the "Messenger" of that city. Machine guns have been brought into action in Belgrade, where hundreds have been slain, it is said, while fatal riots have occurred at Laibach and Agram.

Strong Opposition To Bill Abolishing City Chamberlain

Speakers at Hearing Before Mayor, Advocating Veto, Say Powers of the Office Should Be Increased Strong opposition to the bill abolishing the office of City Chamberlain developed yesterday at the public hearings given by Mayor Hylan on this and other measures passed by the Legislature which affect the city. Comptroller Charles L. Craig, at whose request the bill was introduced at Albany, played virtually a lone part in favoring the bill, and frequently clashed with the well organized opposition which rallied to the support of the Mayor's close friend, Philip Berolzheimer, the present City Chamberlain.

Pope Looks to Palestine

Vatican Gratified by Naming the Commission on Church Claims ROME, April 27.—Nomination of a commission to consider claims of the Holy See in Palestine is a source of gratification to Vatican authorities. Pope Benedict has been greatly interested in problems arising from new conditions there and the possible excessive development of Zionism to the injury of other nationalities.

Call Sent Out to Check Measles Spread in City

With More Than 1,000 Cases, Health Official Warns Physicians, Teachers and Parents A call to teachers, parents and physicians to take special precautions to guard against the further spread of measles was sent out yesterday by Dr. S. D. Hubbard, acting director of the Bureau of Public Health Education of the Department of Health. There are between 1,000 and 1,200 cases of measles in the city.

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Soldiers Equal in Death

Same Type of Headstone for Field Marshal or Private LONDON, April 27.—The War Graves Commission has decided unanimously on absolute uniformity of headstones for the graves of every man and woman who was killed or who died in the war. A plain design in Portland stone has been selected, recording the name, regiment and rank, symbol of religious faith, and the inscription which Kipling chose. "Their name liveth forevermore," with room at the foot of the stone for an inscription, limited to sixty-six words, to be chosen personally by those nearest to the dead. This principle of equality, whether for field marshal or camp follower, has the approval of the government.
