

Yankees Trounce Red Sox Giant Lose Another—Dodgers and Braves Tie in 26 Innings

Ruth Makes Mighty Homer; Shawkey Victor by 6 to 0

Babe Drives Ball Over Right Field Grandstand in Sixth and Lewis Follows With Another Four-Bagger; Yankees in Row With Umpire

By W. O. McGeehan Babe Ruth hit a home run that cleared the top of the right field stands by thirty feet at the Polo Grounds yesterday.

Judges of distance declare that the Ruthian swat of yesterday traveled much more rapidly than his twenty-eighth homer of last season, which also cleared the roof.

It was the first ball pitched in the sixth that Ruth sent out of the lot. The blow must have dazed Pennock, for he shot a straight one over to Duffy Lewis, and Duffy hoisted the same into the left-field bleachers.

Bob Shawkey shut out the Red Sox, 6 to 0. All of which would tend to indicate that the Yankees, after leading a life of shame since the start of the season, were about to hit the straight and narrow trail that leads pennantward.

The game was fairly acrimonious up to this point. "Home Run" Dinneen, the umpire, displaying most of the acrimony, in the fifth he entered the Yankee dugout, flanked by Umpire Mack and banished three of the Yanks—Mays, Shore and O'Doul.

The Yankees got their first run in the opening inning in the thoroughly orthodox fashion. Ward got his base on balls, Peckinpaugh sacrificed and Hipp brought in the run with a hit to center.

The awakening of Ruth came in the fourth. Instead of swinging at distant scenery the Babe this time shot a hit that topped the third grandstand. An out by Lewis sent him to third and he scored when Pratt was thrown out by Foster.

It was a fairly peaceful ball game until the fifth, when the occupants of the Yankee bench began to get uppity in a more or less dispassionate fashion. William Dinneen began to get bits of the conversation and his fists started to turn a delicate purple.

The midge manager, Mr. Huggins, joined in the conversation and began to pick up the conversation throughout the grounds. A wire-haired for terror, which was occupying a box with its fond mistress, added its voice to the din.

The crack of the ball seemed to indicate that the Yanks had awakened for the season. Irvin Shrewsbury Cobb, who was making his first appearance of the season, sailed gracefully in appreciation of the fact that the Yanks had postponed their real start for the season until he could be present.

Duffy Lewis looked for a moment at the top of the stands where Ruth's hit had disappeared. He seemed to conclude that the wall was a trifle too high for him and glanced at the left-field bleachers.

Fortune was only a bit less wild than the wild man from Hackensack and he passed Pipp. That got the bases, with Ruth up and set the stage for some more pyrotechnics; but this time Ruth merely rolled one down to first which hit Shawkey square.

Major League Record Broken; Score Is 1 to 1

Cadore and Oeschger Thrill Hub Fans With Their Long Pitching Duel

BOSTON, May 1.—All major league records were broken here to-day when the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Braves struggled to a 26-inning tie-game at 1 to 1, on Braves Field. Another record was established when Joe Oeschger, the local twirler, and Leon Cadore, of the Dodgers, twirled the entire assignment. The long struggle was brought to an end by darkness, Umpire McCormick calling the game.

A Boston team was also a contestant in the previous longest game that held the record for both leagues. In 1916 the Red Sox and the Philadelphia Athletics fought for twenty-four innings on the local American League field, with the Athletics winning by 1 to 0.

Few of the 15,000 spectators left their seats before the end of the thrilling pitching duel. As the innings passed, Oeschger seemed to become more effective, while Cadore was often nicked for hits. The latter, however, showed his wizardry by holding the local batters in check when danger threatened.

The Dodgers were the first to score. They made their run in the fifth inning and Oeschger's momentary unsteadiness opened the way for the tally. Boston entered the count in the sixth inning and was only prevented from scoring another through a fine relay of Maranville's drive to center field by Hood to Cadore to Krueger, who touched off Boeckel at the plate when the latter attempted to score from second.

In the ninth it appeared as if the Braves would end the game. However, with the bases filled and only one out, Uly Olson and Kenetichy executed a sparkling double play.

After this inning both teams steadied down. Oeschger was turning back the visits of the Braves, while Cadore was also offering up deceptive curves that the Beaneaters could not fathom. The spectators settled back in their seats to watch the renewal of the duel between Oeschger and Cadore in Brooklyn about ten days ago, when Cadore gained the decision in the eleven-inning by 1 to 0.

In the hoodoo thirteenth Holke began proceedings with a single. Kenetichy risked serious injury by bumping into the Boston dugout as he caught Joeekel's foul fly; then Cadore forced Maranville to pop to Ward and struck out the runner.

In the seventeenth inning one of the most remarkable double plays ever seen here retired Brooklyn. The bases were filled and one was out when Elliott grounded to Oeschger. When Ward was forced at the plate, but Gowdy's throw to Holke was low and was fumbled. Kenetichy tried to score from second, but Oeschger's throw to first baseman Olson and Kenetichy threw to one side and threw himself blindly across the plate to meet Kenetichy's spikes with bare fist.

Oeschger's Pass Costly Oeschger aided in giving the Dodgers a run in the fifth inning when he allowed Kenetichy to hit a batter. Cadore criticized his battery mate in the eighth. He gave away to young Oeschger to Holke. Oeschger then smashed a hot one over Maranville's head, scoring Krueger. Oeschger pitched the game to the end of the ninth. He was replaced by Olson.

Multiple by Cruise gave Boston an earned run in the sixth, tying the score. Cadore easily handled Mann's sander. Cruise, however, hit the score board and reached third base. When he made one of his most interesting catches on Holke's short fly, holding Cruise. To third. Boeckel followed with a safe drive to center, which scored Cruise. It looked exceedingly dubious for the Dodgers in the ninth, as three Braves were planted on the bases with only one out. However, a swiftly executed double play, Olson to Kenetichy, killed off Maranville and started the local demonstration with a hit to left. Christenbury, batting for O'Neill beat out an infield hit. Oeschger sacrificed, Cadore to Olson, who covered first base. Powell was passed, filling the bases.

Then followed the spectacular stop by Olson. Pick sent a grounder whizzing to the second baseman, who touched Powell coming down from first base, and then threw to "Koney" for the third out.

PHILADELPHIA, May 1.—It behooves the Giants to trim their batting lumps in short order if they are to get into the pennant race this year. At present they aren't hitting as well as a tall-end club. It may be they are meeting better pitching than the others. But in any event Eppa Rixey, who pitched so effectively against the New Yorkers at the Polo Grounds recently until the seventh, when Gavy Cravens ordered him to pinch-hit for Eppa, again held the men of McGraw hapless in to-day's struggle. The result was that Phillies obtained an easy victory of 5 to 2.

Rixey's twirling tells the story of the contest, as far as the Giants are concerned, for they didn't get much more than exercise swinging at the elongated hurler's offerings. Eppa wound himself up in tight knot and uncoiled such a variety of speed and curves and control that he had things all his own way in the ninth, when his team had a big lead, he eased up and the New Yorkers managed to avoid a shut-out by scoring two tallies.
