



Bolsheviki in Big Attack on 90-Mile Front

Attempt Being Made to Break Polish Lines and Seize Rail Communication Into East Prussia

72,000 Reds in Line

Warsaw Reports Enemy Thrown Back in Two-Day Battle With Losses

WARSAW, May 24 (By The Associated Press).—The Bolsheviki are attacking in waves on the northern fighting front in a thrust to break the Polish lines and open communication with East Prussia. The fiercest fighting in months is raging along the ninety-mile battlefield. Villages are changing hands daily and the lines are swaying to and fro.

The fighting has mostly been infantry encounters through the open swampy country. The latest official statement says that the Russians were thrown back at most places in a two-day battle, suffering heavy losses.

Poles' Morale Stimulated

The fighting spirit of the Poles was stimulated by the finding of bodies of Polish soldiers who, it is declared, had been wounded and then killed by the Russians with rifle bullets. The Bolsheviki were aided in the fighting by aviators, two of whom were brought down by Polish fliers. The Bolsheviki also brought up armored trains. The trains on this front are reported to be officered by Germans, with many trained machine gunners.

Since the Russian offensive began twelve divisions have been identified among the reinforcements constantly appearing. A Bolsheviki division numbers about 6,000 men. Dvinsk, one of the objectives of the Bolsheviki, is a railroad junction on the Dvina, whose capture would give a direct rail line to East Prussia across Lithuania.

Develop Advance Toward Minsk

LONDON, May 24.—The capture of numerous villages on various sectors of the fighting front is announced in an official statement issued by the Soviet government at Moscow Sunday. An advance by the Bolsheviki in the direction of Minsk is being developed, the statement says, a number of villages in the Iumen district, to the southeast of Minsk, having fallen into the hands of the Bolsheviki. The statement says:

"Along the Dnieper the enemy, after pillaging the villages of Radul and Liubatch, retired to the right bank of the Dnieper. In the Svinigorod region (southeast of Kiev) our troops, having held up the enemy's advance, are engaged from twenty to twenty-four versta northwest of Svinigorod."

Occupy Number of Villages

"In the direction of Minsk our troops are developing an energetic advance and have occupied a number of villages north and southeast of Iumen. In the Holodechno direction our troops, as a result of fighting in the vicinity of Veselavino station, have occupied a number of villages northwest of Dokhitcha. On the right bank of the Dvina our troops are advancing on Schlants. In the Ust Serguch region, on a front of ten miles, we have occupied a number of villages six miles west of the river. In the Uman region (115 miles south of Kiev) our armored trains have conducted successful operations, penetrating into the enemy's rear."

30,000 Join Madrid Strike

Jugo-Slavs to Use Troops If Hungary Shuns Treaty

Notify U. S. They Will Mobilize on Border at First Untoward Expression

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Jugo Slavia has notified the State Department of her intention to concentrate troops on the Jugo-Slav-Hungarian border, should Hungary show any disposition not to respect the terms of the Hungarian treaty as laid down by the Supreme Council.

Measures of precaution to guarantee observance of the treaty also are understood to have been taken by Czechoslovakia and Roumania.

Spread of Bolshevism on the border and disregard of demobilization clauses of the armistice in Hungary have brought full accord among the governments of Jugo-Slavia, Roumania and Czechoslovakia as to the necessity for prompt action in the face of the outward expressions of Hungarian intentions to flout the will of the Allies.

Print Paper Tax Proposed

Excise Levy to Curtail Consumption Aim of Senate Bill

WASHINGTON, May 24.—An excise tax on print paper to curtail consumption will be one of the recommendations of the Senate Manufacturers' sub-committee investigating the print paper shortage. A bill for that purpose is being drawn by the committee, assisted by the Federal Trade Commission. The amount of the tax and other details remain to be worked out.

Amendment of postal regulations to permit small quantities of print paper to be shipped to any part of the country at a flat rate of one cent a pound also will be recommended. The present maximum weight of seventy pounds would be retained.

Senator Walsh, Democrat, of Massachusetts, who is preparing the committee report, said he expected to complete it this week.

Eugene Meyer Jr. Resigns

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Eugene Meyer Jr. of New York, managing director of the War Finance Corporation, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted by the President, effective at the end of May.

Sisson Warns of Dangers in Sharp Curbing of Credit

New York Banker Declares Pressure by Financiers to Force Prices Down Will Cause Business Distress

CLEVELAND, O., May 24.—A note of warning relative to the rapid deflation of credit was sounded to-day by Francis H. Sisson, vice-president of the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, speaking before the eighth annual convention here of the Association of Reserve City Bankers. One of the purposes of the meeting is to map out the policy of American banks in the face of falling prices.

"The chief danger in the present situation is that the desirability of low prices as an end in itself may be so exaggerated as to lead to the attempt to force prices down through harmful measures for the control of credit," said Mr. Sisson.

"There seems to be no question that undue speculation should be curbed by restricting further the credit employed in such undertakings. Beyond this, however, there is distinct danger in attempting arbitrarily to reduce general prices by curtailing credit to business undertakings."

"Those who are clamoring for a rapid fall in prices should bear in mind that drastic deflation will mean painful economic adjustments, of which widespread unemployment and business distress would be features. The average man should remember that there is not much advantage in being able to buy two dollars' worth for a dollar if he does not have the dollar."

Mr. Sisson spoke of the present wave of price cutting as "large psychological rather than economic." He said the public was just awakening to the fact that it is not only the beneficiary, but the creator of the phenomenon.

In the opinion of Mr. Sisson, current price reductions are not due to over-production. Underproduction in many lines still exists, he said, and is likely to continue for some time.

"It would be advisable to avoid a hasty conclusion that the present movements forecast a universal and drastic drop in commodity prices," he declared.

"Our problem is not to force a price recession as rapidly and as precipitately as possible, but rather to bring about a gradual readjustment, with a view to stabilization."

Georgians Sign Armistice With Russo-Tartar Force

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 24 (By The Associated Press).—A seven-day armistice was arranged May 19 between the Republic of Georgia and the Russo-Tartar force concentrated at Baku to attack the Georgians.

A Washington dispatch of May 14 quoted dispatches to the State Department as saying that the Georgian government, as a precaution against Bolsheviki activities, had mobilized all men more than twenty-five years old, and had formed a council of defense. The State Department advised said that Georgia would resist the Bolsheviki advance to the utmost.

Fox Film Plant Opened

The new \$2,500,000 home of the Fox Film Corporation at Tenth Avenue and West Fifty-fifth Street was opened yesterday afternoon.

Several thousand guests were present at the dedicatory exercises, in which Governor Edwards of New Jersey, Justice Charles E. Guy and the Rev. Joseph Silverman, took part.

Poles in Teschen Loot Shops and Attack Jews

Clashes With Czechs Continue; French Soldiers Fire Into Crowd, Killing Two

VIENNA, May 22.—Clashes between Poles and Czechs are continuing in the Teschen region, the disputed area on the Polish-Czechoslovak boundary, according to advices reaching here. In the town of Teschen, according to a message received to-day, Polish workmen yesterday demolished the furniture in Silesian clubhouses, plundered shops, attacked Jews and freed Poles who had been arrested on a charge of dynamiting the station. French soldiers fired on the crowd, killing two. At Mahrtsch-Ostrow, the Polish miners in five pits went on strike, demanding the removal of the Czech gendarmerie. The miners in other workings are expected to follow suit.

Hungarian Reply Withheld

Answer to the Peace Conference Will Be Published Monday

BUDAPEST, May 23.—Publication of the Hungarian government's answer to the peace conference, in which it declared the treaty of peace, has been withheld until Monday night, and the public is still ignorant of the government's intention. Newspapers were asked not to print this news because it would affect the festivities incident to Whitsuntide.

In the meantime, editorials preparing the public for the unpleasant news are being printed in leading newspapers. They declare Hungary is under compulsion and cannot oppose the big powers, and assert that neighboring countries are concentrating troops along the frontiers. Police forces and garrisons have been reinforced in case the news results in outbreaks.

Switzerland 'Buried in Gold'

With No Outlet, Industries Are at Standstill, Says Bank Head

GENEVA, May 24.—Switzerland is being buried in a golden avalanche, according to M. Sarasin, president of the Swiss Bank. He says the gold stored in banks has no outlet in Europe, that many industries are at a standstill, and the situation is becoming worse.

The hotel industry is nearly ruined, M. Sarasin declares, largely because the adverse exchange is keeping away tourists, few of whom are here this year. During the war, M. Sarasin adds, the country lost more than 6,000,000,000 francs, including 2,400,000,000 on German scrip, 500,000,000 on Austrian scrip and 400,000,000 through hotels.

Smoot Says Sugar Probe's Aim Is to Defeat Him

Tells Senate He Was Warned Months Ago of Purpose of Inquiry

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Charges that a Federal Trade Commission investigation of the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company was being used in an effort to defeat him for reelection were made in the Senate to-day by Senator Smoot, Republican, of Utah.

Although Senator Smoot said he had only a nominal stock interest in the company, he declared the commission's activities were being directed against his political interests.

"No one can object to any action that can be taken to control or regulate the lawful distribution of sugar," said Senator Smoot, "but when any department of the government undertakes to secure the defeat or election of a United States Senator through the investigation of the affairs of a sugar company it is time that such a contemptible practice be called to the attention of the house."

Months ago, Senator Smoot said, he was advised that the Trade Commission planned to investigate the Utah-Idaho concern just before the election and that among other causes assigned was that it would help defeat him for election. Mr. Smoot said he owned only 40 shares of the stock of the company, paying him \$22 monthly, including 75 shares from his father's estate.

Bonus Measure Delayed

By Opposition in House

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Republican leaders were undecided to-day when they would attempt to bring the soldier relief bill before the House. They had planned tentatively to call it up tomorrow, but Chairman Campbell of the Rules Committee announced to-day that no attempt would be made before Thursday.

Absence of friends of the legislation was said to be among the reasons for delay. A canvass of the House membership indicated that the combination of Democrats and Republicans opposing the cash bonus might indefinitely delay action.

France Needs 500,000 Men

PARIS, May 24.—Four to five hundred thousand imported laborers are needed urgently in France for the devastated regions, according to the newly created Superior Council of Materials and Labor, appointed by Jean Ogier, Minister of the Liberated Regions. It is calculated that France's pre-war force of 1,100,000 builders has been reduced by heavy war casualties and application of the eight-hour law to the equivalent of about 550,000, which is inadequate.

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
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
