

### Legion Aids Tildsley in School Fight

Commander of Belvedere Post Asks Veterans to Write Board Demanding Superintendent's Return

### Americanism His 'Crime'

F. M. Fallon Urges Former Soldiers to Press Case at Meeting on July 14

The American Legion yesterday entered the fight in behalf of Dr. John L. Tildsley to succeed himself as as-

state superintendent of schools. Francis M. Fallon, president of Belvedere Post 450, has issued an appeal to Legion posts in New York County to bring pressure to bear for Dr. Tildsley's reelection by communicating with members of the Board of Education and having a representative present at the July 14 meeting of the board to demand that the official be retained. Mr. Fallon's letter to the Legion posts says, in part: "Dr. Tildsley has been guilty of two grave crimes in the eyes of the radical element in this city: First, he sent a son of his into our fighting forces with us; second, he was responsible for the expulsion from our teaching forces of radical teachers, some of whom stated that the red flag should fly above the American flag. These actions were taken by him in his capacity as the superintendent in charge of Americanism work in our schools. "As president of the largest locality post in this county and as a Legionnaire I am anxious to see him reappointed in order that his sound ideas of Americanism may be carried out in the teaching in our public schools. "The following members of the Board of Education are openly for Dr. Tilds-

ley's reelection: Arthur Somers, 100 William Street, Manhattan; Mrs. Emma Murray, 500 Park Avenue, and Frank D. Wiley, Spuyten Duyvil. The following members are either against him or have not come out openly for him: Anning S. Prall, Staten Island, or 500 Park Avenue, city; George J. Ryan, 46 Jackson Avenue, Long Island City; Dr. John Ferguson, 933 Bushwick Avenue, Brooklyn; and Joseph Yeska, 726 Broadway, Manhattan. "Dr. Tildsley's reelection concerns every member of the American Legion and the welfare of our children who are to go to the public schools. Please write at once to one of the four who are either against Tildsley or have not declared themselves for him and demand Dr. Tildsley's reappointment. Please send a copy of your letter to one of the three members of the board who are in favor of Dr. Tildsley's reelection. "Every paper in New York City except the Hearst papers and 'New York Call' is for Dr. Tildsley. The 'New York Call' is opposing him openly, but the Hearst papers have kept quiet. "This action on your part will be strictly non-partisan and non-religious. You are simply telling the Board of Education that you stand for 100 per cent Americanism in our schools. "I will appear personally before the Board of Education at 4 p. m. or thereafter on July 14 for Dr. Tildsley. Will you be with me? I will appear as a Legionnaire." ### Questioned Jurisdiction

Defendant Insisted She Was U. S. Citizen; Husband Named Mexican in Suit

PARIS July 7.—The Court of Appeal to-day upheld the decision of the lower courts granting Frank Jay Gould a divorce from Edith Kelly Gould.

Mr. Gould obtained a divorce in Paris in 1919. Later Mrs. Gould attempted to have the decree annulled on the ground that the French courts were without jurisdiction, owing to the fact that she was a resident of the United States. The court overruled her plea and sustained the decree to Mr. Gould. The case was carried to the Court of Appeal, with the result that the two previous rulings were sustained.


### Fear Two Yachtsmen Lost

Louis Greenfield, sixteen, of Arverne, was drowned while swimming off Beach Seventy-ninth Street yesterday. His body has not been recovered.

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

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
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
