

Moslems of India to Stage Passive Revolt

Plan to Give Up All British Titles and Honors and Resign From Civil and Military Positions

Also Refuse to Pay Taxes

Drastic Action in Sympathy With Sultan to Soften Turkish Treaty

Drastic action, through a "non-cooperation movement," is planned in India among the Moslems, with Hindu assistance, to force the government to take action toward obtaining such modification of the Turkish peace treaty as will make it more acceptable to the Moslem world, according to advices received here yesterday by the India Information Bureau.

On August 1, it is stated by M. K. Gandhi, a prominent leader in India of the Satyagraha (passive resistance) movement, the newly devised "non-cooperation movement" is to be put into effect, if by that time a favorable reply is not received from the Indian government. This movement, should the plans for it become effective, would be carried out in four progressively serious stages, thus:

- First—Giving up all titles and honors conferred by the crown.
- Second—Resignations from all government offices and from the legislative council.
- Third—Resignation of officers and soldiers from all army duties.
- Fourth—Refusal to pay taxes.

Hindu Leaders Join

The decision to this effect, the bureau says its advices show, was taken at a conference recently held by Moslem and Hindu leaders from all

parts of the country. An executive committee was appointed to organize a volunteer corps to collect subscriptions and prepare the Indian public for this movement, to promote which meetings have been held all over India for some time past.

The Moslems, it is indicated, hold that the treaty as it now stands will injuriously affect Moslem prestige all over the world, and their desire is to compel the Indian government to present their demands for its modification to the treaty-making powers, and have them made effective. The Moslems also hold that the Sultan, as their religious head, should have complete control of Constantinople.

Afghanistan Seeks Honor

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 14 (By The Associated Press).—Afghanistan is claiming to be the greatest Moslem country, and the Emir of Afghanistan is working to succeed the Sultan of Turkey as Commander of the Faithful, according to rumors reaching this city from Angora, where a series of Pan-Islamic conferences have been in session for several months.

This congress, in which representatives of Afghanistan, Syria, Turkey, Arabia, India, Persia, Azerbaijan, Crimea, Egypt and Tripoli are participating, is said to be chiefly concerned with filling the office of Commander of the Faithful in such a manner as to unify the Moslem world. A few weeks ago it was agreed that the post should go to the leader of the chief Mussulman nation, and Turkey's right to the leadership was not challenged. Since Greek forces have advanced into Thrace and Asia Minor, however, it is reported that Afghanistan's claim for first place has been put forward.

The Moslem congress apparently is a continuation of the plan for consolidation of the Mahometan world originated by Enver Pasha, former Turkish Minister of War and leader of the Young Turkey party and fostered by the former imperial German government.

millions of pounds." Continuing, the note says:

"The history of the relations between the Porte and the great powers for a long period before the war was one long story of repeated, unavailing attempts to put an end to atrocities in Bulgaria, Macedonia, Armenia and elsewhere—atrocities which startled and shocked the conscience of mankind.

"During the last twenty years the Armenians have been massacred under conditions of unexampled barbarity, and during the war the record of the Turkish government in massacres, in deportations and in the maltreatment of prisoners of war immeasurably exceeded even its own previous record. It is estimated that since 1914 the Turkish government has massacred on the mendacious pretext of alleged revolt 800,000 Armenians, including women and children, and expelled or deported more than 200,000 Greeks and 200,000 Armenians from their homes.

Says It Organized Savagery

"Not only has the Turkish government failed to protect the subjects of other races from pillage, outrage and murder, but there is abundant evidence that it has been responsible for directing and organizing savagery against people to whom it owed protection.

"For these reasons the Allied powers have resolved to emancipate all areas inhabited by a non-Turkish majority from Turkish rule."

Referring to the provisions of the treaty concerning Smyrna, the Allied note points out that they will not have the effect of restricting the trade of Anatolia. On the contrary, it declares, the freedom of the port is guaranteed. It contends that the treaty leaves Turkey a national state with a large productive area and that there is nothing in the treaty "to prevent Turkey from becoming a prosperous nation if she reforms."

As to Constantinople being left as the capital of Turkey, the Allies say

they have grave doubts as to the wisdom of this step in view of the misuse made by the Turks of their power in the past.

In conclusion the note refers to the possibility of the Allies having to drive the Turks from Europe and fix a ten-day limit for the Turkish acceptance of the treaty.

British Regret Insult to U. S.

Sailors Who Trampled American Flag Get Prison Terms

WASHINGTON, July 17.—British officials at Bermuda have expressed regret for the insult offered the American flag by British sailors July 4, the State Department was advised today in a consular report from Bermuda.

The sailors who participated in the trampling upon the flag have been heavily fined and sentenced to terms of imprisonment, the message added.

Aquitania Sails for New York

LIVERPOOL, July 17.—The Cunard liner Aquitania sailed for New York today on her first passenger trip since the war. The vessel has been converted to an oil burner.

Peace With Poland And Allies Certain, View in Moscow

Armistice Proposal, However, Excites Violent Debate Among Leaders of Bolsheviki Government

COPENHAGEN, July 17.—Reports from Moscow indicate that the British government's proposal regarding an armistice between Soviet Russia and Poland has excited a violent debate among the Soviet leaders.

One party is pointing out the excellent position of the Russian army, with its chance of crushing Poland and furthering the cause of Bolshevism, while the other party, supported by M. Tchitcherin, Foreign Minister, is maintaining that Soviet Russia should come to an amicable agreement with the

western powers and restore internal order, says a dispatch from Narva to the "Berlingske Tidende."

The message says the belief prevails in Moscow that peace with Poland and the Allies is certain.

American Sergeant Missing

WARSAW, July 16.—Sergeant William Cook, of Fay, Okla., attached to the American typhus expedition to Poland, is reported missing since the battle between the Poles and the Bolsheviki in the vicinity of Minsk. The disinfecting train, with which Cook was working, was captured by the Soviet forces, according to the last carload of refugees which left Minsk. Cook refused to leave, telling the refugees he would remain with the train in the hope of getting it out in safety. The Bolsheviki arrived a little later.

Captain Trever Sweet, of Boston, assistant military attaché at the American legation here, was fired on by a squad of Bolsheviki cavalry near Vilna this week, but escaped without injury.

Bolsheviki Report Gains

LONDON, July 17.—A gain of ground by the Bolsheviki against the Poles along the line between Vilna and Minsk is reported in Friday's official statement from Moscow, received by wireless today. The statement says: "West of Smorgon, after fierce fighting, we occupied the village of Solv (forty miles southeast of Vilna)."

"In the direction of Baranovitchi we occupied a number of villages thirty-three miles southwest of Minsk."

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
