Herbert R. Houghton, a member of Houghton & Co., apartment house owners and agents at 200 West Seventy-second Street, was held in \$1,000 bail yesterday in the West Side police court for further examination on a charge of attempted assault, resulting, the police say, from his sudden infatuation for a client and his strenuous lovemaking.

The client, Mrs. Helen Birch, a widow, of 274 West Seventy-first Street, is said to be under the care of a physician. Detectives Moore and Manning, who arrested Houghton on her complaint, said that Mrs. Birch was unable to appear in court, but had asserted that she would appear as soon as she was able to do so.

She rented her present home through Houghton & Co. and said that she had met her husband, R. Houghton, through her knowledge until Tuesday, when she was in his office on a matter of business. Thursday morning, she says, she learned that he was occupying a house at 273 West Seventy-third Street, and she might like to lease it.

She met him by appointment about 5 p. m. Thursday, she says, and went to the house on Seventy-third Street. When he had conducted her to a room upstairs, she says, Houghton began violently to protest his love for her.

Every effort to escape his embrace was futile, the widow says, and he became more and more unrestrained in his actions. She tried to convince him that his suit was as unbecome as his manner of presenting it. Mrs. Birch says, but at last she managed to put an end to the situation by promising to meet him at a later and more important work last night.
