Gorgas Is Buried With Impressive Military Honors

Army and Navy Officers With Many Notable Dignitaries at Funeral Services in Washington

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—The body of Major General William Gorgas, conqueror of yellow fever in Cuba and Panama, and former surgeon general of the army, was buried to-day at Arlington National Cemetery with impressive military honors.

Preceding the army ritual at the grave, three services were held at the Church of the Epiphany, attended by members of the President's Cabinet, members of the diplomatic corps, representatives of American and foreign scientific societies, and officers high in the army and navy.

The military escort consisted of two troops of cavalry, a provisional regiment from the tank corps, a battalion of infantry, two companies of engineers, a company of coast artillery, a troop of ambulances, and three bands.
