

### Buffalo Coal Rationed on Doctors' Orders

District Attorney to Investigate Charge of \$1 by Physicians for Prescription to Get Fuel  
Hundreds Are Frantic  
\$25 a Ton Being Asked in Massachusetts; Gas Shortage Adds to Peril

BUFFALO, Nov. 13.—For the first time in the history of Buffalo coal will be distributed on Sunday. At daylight to-morrow 1,250 tons of coal, the city's entire supply, will be available at the Yates Lehigh trestle. The situation reached such an alarming stage late to-night that hundreds of families were frantic, and the news that a distribution of coal would be made to-morrow was met with elation by hundreds who plan to be on hand long before daylight to obtain whatever is available.

With the mercury hovering at 2 degrees below the freezing point to-night and a semi-gale sweeping the city direct from Lake Erie, the gas supply has dwindled to almost nothing and many eating houses which rely upon gas for cooking have been forced to place improvised wood and electric cooking contrivances in their kitchens.

Rationed on Physicians' Orders  
During the last week the situation has been so acute that many families were forced to produce a physician's prescription to procure coal after they had proven that sickness prevailed in the family. To-night it was learned that a few physicians who have issued such prescriptions have charged \$1 each for them. This has been called to the attention of District Attorney Guy B. Moore, and to-night an official of the District Attorney's office said that an investigation would be started.

Less than seven thousand tons of coal has come into Buffalo during the last two weeks, and many sections have been without a ton of coal for nearly a month. The closing of navigation, which it was thought would relieve the situation here, has apparently failed to do so.

Anthracite is quoted at \$13.25 a ton in Buffalo.
