

Marines Turn Port-au-Prince Into Clean City

Squalor and filth in evidence everywhere when forces took charge five years ago. Disappears Fear Smallpox Epidemic

Lack of tact by Americans, however, antagonizes a large number of Haytiens

From a Special Correspondent PORT-AU-PRINCE, Hayti, Nov. 20.—The benefits of Uncle Sam's marine occupation in Hayti are undeniable and more evident to those who can compare the Hayti of today with the little black West Indian republic of yesterday.

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Haytiens Shiftless Even today sanitation means little to the rank and file. The obnoxious lured masses doubtless would be more happy and content if they were not so poor.

Health Service in Charge Contrary to the general belief, United States marines have nothing to do with Haytian sanitation at present.

Epidemic of Smallpox This objection sometimes laps over into the Haytian-American Public Health Service. Example No. 1:—Port-au-Prince is today suffering a more or less serious epidemic of "allstrim."

Enforcing sanitation in Hayti carries three men were brought into camp by the service for the same offense. One was a Haytian, another a Britisher who had married a Haytian.

Workman's Fall Uncovers Statue Of Caesar Augustus in Rome

Comrades in Digging Out Victim of Accident Come Upon Temple of Jove and Bust of Great Emperor

From a Special Correspondent ROME, Nov. 25.—During the last week the Government Department of Excavations has extended a work in order to give thousands of unskilled workmen out of jobs sufficient employment to keep them from being idle.

The temple which has just been excavated is of the sixth or seventh century B. C. It is known as the temple of Jove, and is situated in the center of the city.

The inscription found near the pedestal reads: "Presente et reditu domini nostri Augusti Caesaris." Up to the present the experts have not decided at what epoch in the life of the emperor all of the arts, this statue was made.

Cooperation Lacking This mutual distrust and lack of cooperation serves to handicap many constructive agencies in Hayti to-day. Example No. 2 in the health service here follows:—

The Haytian sanitary code rightfully prescribes that malefactors must be tried before the Justices of the Peace, who incidentally are Haytiens appointed by the President. The Justices are usually light. Among the other things which have been done are mosquito breeding swamps and other nuisances have been some Americans.

Wales Barred to Mrs. Bryce Ex-Ambassador's Sister-in-Law Prevented From Landing DUBLIN, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Annan Bryce, wife of the one-time member of Parliament for Inverness, and sister-in-law of Lord Bryce, formerly British Ambassador to the United States, recently was prevented by British authorities from landing in Wales to deliver an address. She was sent back to Ireland and soon released.

England Revels In Sensational Greenwood Case

Conservative British Newspapers, Forgetful for None, Give First Place to Alleged Wife. Slayer

Eternal Triangle Appears Lawyer, Accused of Poisoning His Spouse to Wed Another, Is Acquitted

By Harold E. Scarborough From The Tribune's European Bureau LONDON, Nov. 19.—The most sensational criminal trial of recent years in Britain came to an end when Harold Greenwood, a solicitor of Kidwelly, Wales, was acquitted of the charge of murdering his first wife by administering arsenic.

For seven days the little village of Carmarthen, where the trial was held, has jostled Paris and New York and even London from the display positions in the newspapers. The average Londoner knew as much about Carmarthen, Wales, as the average New Yorker did about Mount Clemens, Mich. before the famous Ford libel suit was brought to trial there.

Less than a month later Harold Greenwood became engaged to Miss Gladys Jones, an employee of the Kidwelly Mercury, and three months after this date he was married to her. Early in the next year anonymous letters, intimating that the death of the first Mrs. Greenwood was not due to natural causes, began to reach the authorities.

Small-town gossip was condemnatory of Greenwood. A few months he had married a girl many years younger than the first Mrs. Greenwood. What more natural than that he had discreetly got rid of the first Mrs. Greenwood? It was the second?

When the case came to trial before Justice Shearman at the Carmarthen Assizes Greenwood had retained Sir Edward Marshall Hall, one of the foremost criminal lawyers of England, to defend him. The Crown's case was presented by Sir Marley Sampson.

The first sensation of the trial proper came when Dr. Griffiths, the pathologist who had examined Mrs. Greenwood for many years, and who had testified on three separate occasions that on the occasion of her fatal illness he had administered morphine, was asked to give evidence that the two pills which he gave Mrs. Greenwood to quiet her following the attack of acute indigestion which preceded her death contained arsenic.

Daughter Drank Wine But he admitted that he had given her a 250 diamond ring, which he had originally purchased for his daughter, Mrs. Irene, when she was twenty-two years old. There also was the question of a traveling bag, which Greenwood asserted was a present to Miss Jones from the staff of the Kidwelly Mercury, but which he had been chosen to present her.

Opera Prices Soar in Austria VIENNA, Nov. 7.—The state opera and a state theater, formerly subsidized by the crown and now maintained by the republic, show a deficit of about 20,000,000 crowns for the year. As a result prices are to be increased heavily. In the crowns, which are worth seventy-five cents, formerly cost 60 crowns, against a minimum of 500 now. Gallery seats have risen correspondingly and now sell at 18 crowns.

Not Guilty Is Verdict

For two and a half hours the jury deliberated. Then it returned to the courtroom. The little hall was filled with thirty persons in addition to the officials and the newspaper reporter upon your verdict?

"Not guilty," answered the foreman in a low voice. A cheer began in the back of the court, which was suppressed by the bailiffs a moment before it was raised. Greenwood's long, rather cynically face, surrounded by a mass of wavy hair, turned red with indignation from the back and disappeared. A few minutes later a muffled figure entered a waiting motor car and sped away. The crowd followed it for a moment and then dispersed.

One hears much in England about the sensationalism of the news. Upon Sinclair's remarkable book about his experiences with the American press has recently been placed on sale here and is being purchased as eagerly as books are bought in these days.

Neither group is representative. But in the papers which upheld the oldest traditions of British journalism—The Morning Post, the Daily Telegraph and the Times—was more a "nuisance" and Labor was unheard of. The Times, which under Northcliffe ownership is not a newspaper but a "medium" for the dissemination of the opinions of the editor, the Evening Standard and the Globe, Tory to the core—in all of these the Greenwood case had been treated in a different way.

The Greenwood case took possession of the popular mind in a way which scarcely any one event since the war has done. As the trial proceeded the probability of Greenwood's acquittal or conviction was a matter of almost daily concern to the public.

Socialist Party Of Italy Ready For Revolution

Prepared to Take Over Government in Name of Proletariat and Institute Socialist Regime, Says Report

200,000 in Organization Political and Economic Conditions Decried to Make Revolt Imperative

From a Special Correspondent ROME, Nov. 19.—The first report of the Italian Socialist Party, which has just been published, contains many details demonstrating clearly how much progress the Socialist creed has made in the last three years.

The report admits the victory of the Maximilians, at Bologna, where they obtained 48,000 votes against the center and reformist wings, who only succeeded in capturing 14,000. It is asserted that in the elections of November, 1919, the Socialists obtained 2,000,000 votes out of 5,000,000, which gave the party 158 seats in the House of Deputies, leaving only 350 for members of all other parties.

At present the Socialist party is divided into five different elements. The first are the Reformists, who are partisans of collaborating with the governing classes seeking a coalition in the government of the country, with the Borghese. During the war they always voted against loans. In all their political acts the Reformists have bowed to the discipline of the party and have day by day trended more toward the Right Wing.

Faction Deals With Labor The second faction is the Labor element. The members of this wing belong to organizations and many of them are peasants. They represent a transitory form between Reformist and Socialists. They deal principally with economic questions.

Factions Submit to Party One must not forget, the Socialist report says, that these various distinctions are not the result of factionalism in the Parliamentary group are artificial and do not really amount to a line of demarcation, nor to a formal organization of factions.

Party Controls 400 Towns One may realize the strength of the party, the report points out, by its daily paper, The Avanti, published in Milan, Rome and Torino. The circulation is 400,000 a day. The party also controls 400 municipalities, including Milan and other important towns.

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Mt. Popocatepet Found In State of Mild Eruption

Four Americans Settle Question By Ascending to Crater of Mexican Volcano

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 12.—The question which has been violently agitated in the newspapers recently, whether Mount Popocatepetl is smoking, apparently has been settled in the affirmative by various persons who within a last few days have ascended this famous volcanic mountain.

The ascent of the mountain is made by way of Amecameca, a small village at its base. Mules carry the climbers to the bottom of the trail and from there it is an exhausting struggle through knee-deep snow coated with a deceptive covering of sand.

U. S. Government to Sell 4 Old-Time Transports Bids To Be Received for the Meade, Kilpatrick, Crook and Warren PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 27.—Coinciding with the delivery from the Hog Island shipyard of three of the eleven army transports comes the announcement from the Army Transport Service of the proposed sale of the old-time transports, Meade, Crook, Kilpatrick and Warren, vessels which have served the navy with excellent records for thirty years or more.

2,000 New Schools for Italy ROME, Nov. 8.—Two thousand new schools are to be opened as soon as possible to combat illiteracy in Italy and a first appropriation has been made of 12,000,000 lire. One hundred thousand teachers are needed and some 50,000 have already been engaged.

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
