

Big Boxing Purposes To Be Abolished

National Body Soon to Control The Ring Game

Governors of 18 States to Send Delegates to Three-Day Convention Here

Formation of a national body to govern and control professional boxing will be undertaken in this city next month, it was learned to-night. Delegates appointed by the Governors of eighteen states will convene at the headquarters of the International Boxing Club here on January 10, 11 and 12.

The new association, which will absorb the Amateur Boxing and the National Board of Boxing Control, of which it is really a development, will be formed by carefully selected and officially appointed delegates from the following states: New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Maryland, New Jersey, Connecticut, Colorado, Wisconsin, Montana, Minnesota, Oregon, West Virginia, Louisiana, Washington, Florida, Tennessee and Oklahoma.

The conference is the culmination of more than six months of correspondence and in some cases personal conferences between the officials of the International Sporting Club and the governors of the states which will delegate representatives to the meeting.

Each delegate will have the written authority to represent his state in the conference and to act for the same in the formation of the organization, which will not be named until after the conference begins. The delegates also will have the power to return to their respective states after the conference with the idea of having the necessary changes made in the legislative rules so that all will govern boxing under the standards to be adopted by the new association.

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Duffy's Record May Be Placed Back in Books

A. A. U. Considering Restoration of Mark of 9.35 Seconds for 100-Yard Run

Arthur Duffy's world's record of 9.35 seconds for running 100 yards, made nearly a generation ago, may be restored to the books of the Amateur Athletic Union at the next convention of the national body. This was indicated last night at the meeting of the board of managers of the local association, held in St. Bartholomew's parish house.

It was stated that the Boston A. A. would submit evidence to show that Duffy was not a professional when he made the record. Various organizations would support the Boston club and the New England association's application for the restoration of the record.

Among other amendments to the rules of the A. A. U. which were discussed was that suggested by the Hawaiian association and adopted at the national convention, to the effect that women swimmers wear suits which cover most of the body and that they provide themselves with throats to be worn until the start of the race.

It also was decided to hold boxing bouts and swimming contests each afternoon and evening during the week of January 21 at Madison Square Garden in conjunction with the Sportsmen's Show.

Frank Zuna, the veteran Newark long distance runner, has obtained permission to compete in the final race at Philadelphia on January 1. He, the past Frank has been reprimanded for running out of town without a permit from the A. A. U. called yesterday afternoon at headquarters for a permit also to get the "low down" on the new expense allowance.

The eighth annual Hollywood Broad road race, which will start at Broadway and Hudson Street, Yonkers, at 2 p. m. on New Year's Day has attracted a large entry. The estimated value of prizes of unusual value will be distributed.

The 220-yard Metropolitan swimming championship will be decided at the New York A. C. Wednesday, January 12. Other events include a water polo contest, a 100-yard freestyle, 100-yard handicap and 150-yard medley race.

Entries for the state amateur boxing championships which will be held in the city on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, closed last night. Among prominent contenders are Willie Singer, of the 92d Street Y. M. H. A., Ben Ponceau, of the St. Christopher's Club, 135-pound local champion, Milton Weiss and Sam Lagonia, who compete in the 156-pound class.

Angon Wins Third Race In Row on Muddy Track. NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 27.—Angon, carrying top weight of 128 pounds and the Mermentau Handicap, a five and a half furlong race for all ages, was at home in the heavy going at Jefferson Park to-day and had no trouble in scoring over Rapid Day and Cock of the Roost, which finished in the order named. Murray rode the winner, the colts of L. Guttry. This is the third straight win for Angon in his last three starts on a heavy track.
