

Official Count Puts 1920 Vote At 26,759,708

Harding's Plurality Over Cox Was 7,001,763; New York Gave 1,868,411 to the Republican Candidate

Drys Got 187,470 Ballots Debs Received 914,869 and Farmer-Labor Nominee 252,435 in 18 States

Interesting comparisons of the popular vote for President in 1920 and 1916 are made possible by official figures of various state election canvassing boards, compiled by The Associated Press and made public yesterday.

Harding's plurality over Cox was 7,001,763. Four years ago President Wilson's plurality over Charles Evans Hughes was 591,355. New York State gave Harding a vote of 1,868,411, his largest return in any one state, as compared with 780,744 for Cox.

The 1920 vote for Eugene V. Debs, Socialist candidate, was 914,869, while in 1916 Benson polled only 585,113. Four years previously, however, Debs rolled up a vote of 897,011.

Dr. Aaron Watkins, nominee of the Prohibitionists, polled a total vote of 187,470, a decrease of 33,036 from the party vote of 220,506. Out of a total of more than 500,000 votes cast in North Carolina the dry candidate received 17,660 dry ballots.

The total vote polled by Parley Christensen, Farmer-Labor nominee, was 252,435. Out of a total of 429,500, the Socialist-Labor candidate received 42,950 votes, and Macaulay, nominee of the Single Tax party, 5,747.

The total vote of 1920, an increase of 9,091,881 over four years ago, was largely due to the enfranchisement of women by the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution.

Franklin Tribute Will Mark Thrift Week Program Here

In addition to celebrating his birth the occasion will mark the 200th anniversary of the beginning of Franklin's notable literary career, as it was in 1721, when he was fifteen years old, that he made his first contribution, anonymously, to his brother's paper, The New England Courant, founded that year in Boston.

Virginia Professor Questions Michelson's Star Measurements

Declares Giant Globe May Have Diameter of 520 Million Miles and Be 300 Light Years Distant From This Sphere

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Jan. 9.—Betelgeuse, the giant star whose dimensions and distance have been measured by Professor Albert A. Michelson, of the University of Chicago, may be twice as large and twice as far away as announced by the Chicago physicist, according to a statement to-day by Dr. S. A. Mitchell, director of the Leander McCormick Observatory, at the University of Virginia.

Addressing the American Physical Society recently, Professor Michelson said that by perfecting the "interference method" of measuring star diameters, he had determined the diameter of Betelgeuse to be 260,000,000 miles and that with light traveling at the rate of 186,000 miles a second, the star is 150 light years away from the earth.

Instead of this measurement, Dr. Mitchell says that Betelgeuse may be 520,000,000 miles in diameter and its distance from the earth 300 light years. He adds that the star's exact measurements will not be definitely known until March, 1922, when photographic measurements extending over a period of two years at the McCormick Observatory are being made public.

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City and Hunter Colleges Defended By La Guardia

Writes Dr. Mezes Their Abandonment Is Unnecessary, for Savings Easily Can Be Made Elsewhere

Exception to proposals for the abandonment of the College of the City of New York and Hunter College is taken by F. H. La Guardia, President of the Board of Aldermen, who outlines his position in a letter sent yesterday to Dr. Sidney E. Mezes, president of the former institution.

Mr. La Guardia says he recognizes the necessity of a reorganization of the municipal government upon a basis to promote economy, but that he sees no objection to the continuance of the two institutions but a concerted attack by officeholders and politicians who would sacrifice the colleges in order to retain their jobs.

Franklin was the founder of the first public library in the colonies. The American Library Association, one of the agencies supporting the National Thrift Week, which it is planned to make an annual occasion throughout the country, will help to pay his honorarium, says La Guardia.

Memorial Service For Levi P. Morton Held at Cathedral

Elihu Root, Dr. Robbins and Dr. Slattery Eulogize Late Statesman and Banker; Point Lessons in Career

Elihu Root and others paid tribute to the late Levi P. Morton, Vice-President of the United States and Governor of the State of New York, at memorial services held yesterday at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

The memorial sermon was preached by the Rev. Dr. Charles L. Slattery, rector of Grace Church, of which Mr. Morton was a member for many years.

Dr. Robbins, reviewing briefly Mr. Morton's rise from a poor boy in Vermont to one of the leading bankers of the world, said that his promotion was not due to the aid of powerful friends, nor to the fact, but to the sterling qualities in the man.

Mr. Morton was not an orator nor a writer, Mr. Root pointed out, and had no great gift of genius. He was, however, a man of great character, and his life was a lesson in the value of integrity and dignity as Vice-President and Governor, and through him the standard of public service was raised.

Dr. Slattery gave a brief sketch of Mr. Morton's life and told how, when Mr. Morton failed as a politician during the Civil War because of the heavy credit he had given the South, he afterwards invited his creditors to a dinner at which he was given the feeling that the plates covering all that was due to him were being taken away.

Dr. John Beattie Crozier, Philosopher, Writer, Dies

Canadian Physician Was Noted as Political Economist and Author of First Rank

LONDON, Jan. 9.—John Beattie Crozier, physician, philosopher, historian and political economist, died in London Saturday.

John Beattie Crozier was born in Canada in 1847. He was educated at the Galt grammar school and Toronto University. His published works include "The Religion of the Future," "Civilization and Progress" (translated into Japanese), "History of Intellectual Development," and "Sociology Applied to Politics."

Dr. Crozier was granted two civil list pensions each by the British government. He was a strong proponent of the campaign against the policy of England in the Boer war, and was the author of "The Boer War." He was a writer on philosophy and letters, but he had few superiors in England and none in Canada.

Chinese Janine Tax Delayed

PEKING, Jan. 9.—The 10 per cent increase in the customs surtax, announced by the Chinese government, will become effective on February 16, instead of January 15, as originally planned, the Finance Ministry announced. The change in dates was made at the request of the Foreign Legations.

He was postmaster of Bloomsburg and delegate to the Republican National Convention three times, the last in 1904. He was a member of the Warren G. Harding Club for twenty-five years. He was editor and publisher of The Columbia County Republican.
