Junior League to Stage Performance for Charity

Debutantes of Season by Songs and Dances Will Illustrate Chairs of Early and Modern Periods in Musical Comedy To Be Produced at Waldorf-Astoria

No entertainment of the winter is looked forward to with keener anticipation and pleasure than the annual production given for charity by members of the Junior League. It is strictly amateur, arranged in every detail by members of the organization, and those taking part in the songs, dances and other features are all members of the league. Most of the debutantes of the season will take part in some way, either appearing in the cast or selling programs, flowers, candies and cigarettes.

The entertainment will be given on three evenings of this week, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, at the Waldorf-Astoria, and dancing will follow the performances. It is called "Musical Chairs," and chairs of various periods, Chinese, early English, Renaissance and mid-Victorian, will be illustrated by songs and dances. A dance representing a game of "Blind Man's Buff," will illustrate the Louis XV. period, and, from what has been learned about it, it will be one of the "hits" of the play.

The second part of the program will be more up-to-date and will illustrate modern chairs and seats. In this division will be seen a football game, also a chorus girl number, a cowboy dance, a dance of the toys and a scene in the park. Gerald Warburg has written a number of the songs. Emerson McMullin, 53, also has contributed numbers.
