The party was chaperoned by Edward Brannick, traffic manager extraordinary, and as the train bearing the ball tossers steamed through Buffalo at dusk tonight Monsieur Edward reported all hands well and taking their dining car nourishment regularly and greedily.

Penn State Pitching Ace Stars for South To Become a Yankee

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., Feb. 27.—E. T. Gramley, star hurler on last year's Penn State nine, left here today for Shreveport, La., where he will report for a try-out with the New York Yankees. Gramley won eleven straight games last spring and was undefeated. Included in his victories were four shut-outs. He is twenty-one years old.

Gramley was "discovered" by Dick Harley, the old Philadelphia National League star, in 1917, when Harley was coaching at Penn State. Gramley was not out for the team, but one day he peeled off his coat and started to "toss 'em up" to a member of the squad. Harley spotted him and ordered Gramley to get into a uniform.

The youngster went on the northern trip the following week and won three straight games before the season ended. In 1919 he was a dependable winner and last year he was Hugo Bezdek's ace.

Frank Frisch, of Fordham, is the only personage of the new type in Brannick's coterie of today. In fact he was the lone "veteran," and he is a Giant of only one year's standing.
