Norseman Lost Wanted In Police Trial

Subpoena to Give Evidence in Perjury Case Against Ex-Detectives Gunson and Moloney Awaited Dahl

Thor Dahl, the wealthy young Norwegian said to have disappeared from the steamship Bergensford during a storm at sea, is according to a statement made yesterday by Assistant District Attorney Josh H. Banton, the Theodore Dahl who is wanted as a material witness against John J. Gunson and Joseph H. Moloney, former detectives under indictment for perjury.

Information in the possession of the District Attorney's office is alleged to show that the man actually present at the time of Mrs. Love's arrest was Theodore Dahl. In some manner, as yet unexplained, the latter disappeared at the time, but was found before he left for Norway, and made, it is said, a statement, now in the possession of the District Attorney's office, exonerating Mrs. Love. It was pointed out, therefore, that Dahl's disappearance would not aid the two indicted men.

McFadden's Maid Refuses To Let Them Drop Charge Freed Governess May Sue for Arrest in \$500,000 Gem Robbery Mystery

PHILADELPHIA, March 25.—Counsel for Mlle. Blanche Maguit, formerly maid to Mrs. George H. McFadden Jr., of Villanova, who is under bail on charges of larceny and conspiracy, said today he would not allow the charges to be dropped quietly.
