

Harding Backs Plans to Help War Wounded

Influence to Cut Red Tape Which Prevents Thousands Receiving Care, Says Mrs. Robinson

Meeting to Discuss Aid Serious Condition of Veterans To Be Taken Up at the Town Hall This Week

President Harding is keenly alive to the necessity of immediate Congressional action to provide proper care for the 20,000 or more World War veterans outside hospitals who require medical attention. This was made known yesterday in a telegram from Mrs. Corinne Roosevelt Robinson to the National Security League. The league will meet at the Town Hall next Thursday night and the condition of disabled ex-service men will be discussed. Mrs. Robinson, who will be one of the speakers, telegraphed as follows from Washington:

"The women of our committee were received in conference by President Harding and presented to him a letter urging him to use his influence to eliminate red tape to the end that disabled service men should receive proper care and consideration. He answered cordially that he would do all in his power."

List of Disabled Grows
Lemuel Bolles, national adjutant of the American Legion, made public a statement yesterday which he intends presenting at the meeting. He said: "There are more than 20,000 former members of the A. E. F. who need medical attention and who are outside hospitals. The tide is rising at the rate of 1,500 a month with the alarming after effects of poison gas, influenza and improper medical treatment."

"These disabled are now scattered over a thousand private hospitals, in county jails, insane asylums and poor farms without government supervision and in over 100 government hospitals in which the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service declares there are 10,347 beds fit, inflammable or otherwise unsuited for the purpose used."

"Great confusion obtains and delays of from nine months to two years occur in the disabled men's efforts to receive the compensation to which they are so richly entitled, while their wives, mothers and children are objects of public pity and charity; this in light of the fact that there are 93,000 such cases now pending before the Bureau of War Risk Insurance which never have been reached, with 10,000 of these cases over nine months old."

Deserted by Their Country
"It is absolutely essential that the Bureau of War Risk Insurance be decentralized and authorized to establish regional offices all over the country and to seek out and minister to our unfortunate men wherever they are in need. The present hospital facilities for these men are criminally inadequate; there is no continuing hospital program provided and we feel, and these men believe, that they have been deserted by the country for the protection of which their bodies yet suffer the honorable wounds of battle in her defense."

Speakers at Thursday night's meeting will include F. W. Galbraith, national commander of the American Legion; J. Mayhew Wainwright, assistant Secretary of War; Dr. Thomas W. Salmon, a member of the American Legion's hospitalization committee, and Dr. H. A. Pattison, of the National Tuberculosis Association. Herbert Barry will preside.

\$20,000,000 Due N. Y. Central
WASHINGTON, March 26.—The Interstate Commerce Commission certified to the Secretary of the Treasury today that \$20,000,000 was due the New York Central Railroad as part payment of the government guaranty for the six months' period after the release of the roads from Federal control.

General Weather Conditions
WASHINGTON, March 26.—Pressure remains high in the Eastern states, and it is high and rising rapidly over the North-western states and the Rocky Mountain region. Above these regions of high barometric pressure there is an extensive area of low pressure that extends from Lake Superior westward to the Mexican border, and within it there are two storm centers, one marked intensify over Iowa and the other over the upper Rio Grande Valley. The former storm has been attended by heavy rain in the region of the Great Lakes and the upper Mississippi Valley and by rains changing to snow in the northern plain states and the Rocky Mountain region. It has also been attended by shifting gales in the upper Mississippi Valley and over the plate states.

It has been followed by much colder weather over the northern plain states and the Rocky Mountain region, and to-night the temperature was below freezing, with heavy falling in Montana, the Dakotas, western Minnesota, western and central Nebraska, eastern Colorado and northern New Mexico. Abnormally warm weather prevailed throughout the Eastern and Southern states and in the great central valley. In the New England states and eastern New York, the weather will be generally overcast, with mild temperatures and occasional showers on Sunday and rain and colder weather Monday. In the Middle Atlantic states it will be warm and partly cloudy, with occasional showers on Sunday and unsettled, with showers and cooler on Monday. In the South Atlantic states it will generally be fair, sunny and partly cloudy and warmer, with local showers on Sunday. In the east Gulf states there will be local showers Sunday and Monday, but considerably cooler weather Monday. In Tennessee and the Ohio Valley and the upper lake region there will be showers Sunday and rain and rain, followed by clearing and much colder weather on Monday. In the upper lake region there will be rain, changing to snow Sunday afternoon or night and much colder weather, with a cold wave and snow Sunday and cold weather Monday.

Wallis Calls at White House

Commissioner Wants More Beds and Baths at Island

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Fredrick A. Wallis, Commissioner of Immigration at New York, was among the callers at the White House today. He said he had come to Washington to go over details of immigration matters with the Department of Labor. Discussing immigration with newspaper men at the executive offices, Mr. Wallis said the policy should look to careful selection of immigrants abroad and to distribution on this side.

Mr. Wallis said the new commissioner general, Mr. Husband, was interested in these phases of the subject and was taking hold of the work in excellent fashion. Ellis Island, according to Mr. Wallis, can take care of the approximately 500,000 immigrants who would come over under the new Dillingham plan which Mr. Wilson vetoed. Additional facilities are needed there, however, chiefly more beds and baths.

Mr. Wallis deplored the fact that many of the immigrants arrive with little or no money.

Ford Finances Improve

Increased Sales Put Company in Position to Pay Obligations

DETROIT, March 26.—Increased sales of cars during the last month have placed the Ford Motor Car Company on a firm financial foundation and made the solution of most of the pressing financial troubles an easy matter, a company official said today. For the present, he added, no further financial aid will be necessary.

It is understood that when \$35,000,000 in Federal taxes and outstanding loans fall due May 1 the company will be in a position to meet the demands with cash now on hand.

The sale of Ford cars this month is expected to total more than 30,000, all built at much lower cost than before the recent business slump.

Mahany's Resignation Accepted

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Rowland B. Mahany, former solicitor of the Department of Labor, to-night made public a letter from President Harding accepting Mr. Mahany's resignation as representative of the United States on the International Commission on Immigration and Emigration, to which he was appointed by President Wilson.




