Committee for Russian Relief Arranges Bazaar

Articles Made by Refugees To Be Sold at the Hotel Plaza on April 28 and 29. Invitations will be issued this week for a bazaar and dance to be given at the Plaza, April 28 and 29, for the benefit of the American Central Committee for Russian Relief. Mme. Gregory Ivolovskiy is chairman of the committee of arrangements and Mrs. T. J. Oakley Rhineland is in charge of entertainment. Mrs. Nathaniel Thayer Robb will marshal a group of debutantes, who will appear in Russian costumes and assist at the dance. Other members of the committee are Mrs. Charles H. Boynton, Mrs. John D. Prince, Mrs. William H. Rockhill, Mrs. Frederic Couderd and Mrs. Norman deK. Whitehouse. The bazaar has been arranged to introduce into this country the handicrafts of Russian refugees with a view to establishing a permanent market for this work in order to enable the refugees to become self-supporting. Russian cross-stitch linens, children's clothing, dresses, gowns, shawls with cross-stitch work in bright colors, toys and dolls in costumes typical of various provinces in Russia will be sold. The proceeds going directly to the refugee workrooms from which the goods came. These workshops for the most part are in Paris, Switzerland and Warsaw. The women who are doing the work are members of the educated classes, many of them wives of one-time officials and of professional men who are now penniless.
