Pershing Warns of Alien Influences To Divide Allies

General Condemns Foreign-Born Citizens of U. S. Who Seek to Weaken Friendship for War Associates

PHILADELPHIA, April 7.—A warning that foreign influences, dangerous in their tendencies, are again at work to weaken the close ties of friendship that bind us to those peoples beside whom we fought in the great war was sounded here to-night by General John J. Pershing, who addressed two mass meetings in the concluding exercises of All-American Day.

Praising the patriotism of foreign-born citizens, whom he said he had seen fight under the American flag in the Philippines in Mexico and in France, General Pershing said that oftentimes their enthusiasm for America has surprised that of any native born "who have not always lived up to the obligations of their birth."
