LAKEWOOD, N. J., April 9.—Hosts of sojourners returning from the Southern resorts on their way north to fill in the gap between the winter and summer seasons give every indication that the spring season at Lakewood will be one of the most notable in many years. The first of the spring balls took place last night, both the Laurel House and the Laurel in the Pines being the scenes of formal affairs in which many of the cottage folk participated. The formalities which marked the previous spring seasons apparently is to be disregarded this year. There is every indication that from now on until the close of the season informal affairs, such as teas, card parties and small luncheons, will be the order of the day.

On the sport calendar spring activities are doing their best to crowd each other out. Racquet wielders turned out in full force this week, the courts at the hotels, the Country Club and private homes being thronged with tennis enthusiasts.

Every one seems to be anxious to try out the new eighteen-hole golf course at the Country Club, the players being more numerous this week than ever before.
