



JAMAICA BAY OF THE FUTURE—an immense landlocked harbor within the city limits larger than Manhattan and the Bronx combined—thirty-two square miles that would supply 156 miles additional dockage room to the harbor of New York. From the time the Dutch first settled New Amsterdam until recently the commercial advantages afforded by Jamaica Bay have never been fully appreciated. Last month ocean freighters entered Jamaica Bay—the first in 300 years—irrefutable proof that oceangoing craft can negotiate the present entrance channel in safety. Ten vessels have recently been moored in the main channel, and it is planned to soon anchor sixty there altogether. Above is pictured the Jamaica Bay of the near future, showing how the latent advantages of this great New York asset will be fully developed.
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


