Pipp Leads Yankees at Bat With Double and Two Singles

Underhand Twirler Shows Remarkable Form After Rain Holds Up Polo Grounds for Half an Hour; "Babe" Ruth Fails to Make One Safety

The Yankees met the ex-Yankees for the first time this season at the Polo Grounds yesterday afternoon upon a muddy field. The present Yanks won by a score of 4 to 0. The masterly pitching of Carl Mays was responsible for the downfall of the Red Sox, and Mr. Harry Frazee shivered on one of those newly-painted red press box seats while the goose eggs were being handed out to his hirelings.

Wally Pipp was the man who delivered the goods when the first and all-necessary run was made. And it was more than auspicious for Wally, as his forebear, Colonel Pipp, from Detroit, was watching every move of his fledgling. Of course, Chick Fewster deserves a part of the credit for that first run, for Chick was the boy that opened matters with a single to left. Peckinpaw contributed a nifty sacrifice bunt. The Big Babe added nothing but a long towering fly to right, which was gobbed by Hendrix, and then came Wally with a hot smash to center, which carried Fewster over. Three more runs were scored by the Yankees, and inasmuch as the rival Red Sox made none, the story of the game as far as the offensive end is concerned can be told by relating how the things that counted happened.

Yankees Score in Sixth
In the sixth inning, for instance, the Colonels' boys made their second run. The omnipresent Pipp, in the presence of his watchful father, led off with a double to right field, the ball skimming along inside the foul line and out of reach of Stuffie Melvin. Bob Meusel fouled to the perturbed Stuffie, picking out one of Sam Jones' most erratic shots as he pitched. Pincus Bodie, after a terrific swing, met the ball in lopsided fashion and Jones fielded Pipp's dribbler to first.
