Allied Nations to Pay Honor To American Soldier Dead

43,000 Graves Will Be Decorated Memorial Day in 77 Centers in France; Ambassador Wallace to Place Wreath on Tomb of Unknown French Hero

PARIS, May 23 (By The Associated Press).—All the nations with which the United States was associated during the World War will pay tribute to the American soldier dead next week. Ceremonies covering two days will take place in Paris, beginning Sunday morning and ending Monday—Memorial Day—in the Suresnes cemetery.

High Honors Paid To Admiral Sims At English Port

Representative of Admiralty Greets American Leader, Who Is Cheered by Crews on Vessels at Liverpool

From The Tribune's European Bureau LONDON, May 23.—Rear Admiral Sims received a tumultuous welcome on his arrival at Liverpool to-day. As a mark of honor to the officer who commanded the American fleet during the war, two British destroyers, formerly of the Grand Fleet, met the liner Cedric forty miles out and accompanied her to port.

Admiral Sims declared his mission to England was solely a personal one to receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Cambridge University which he had received during the war. Among these recently returned to the pier he was then taken aboard the battleship Valiant to inspect the crew and a guard of honor of 100 marines. As Admiral Sims returned to the pier he was cheered by the Cedric's whole crew of stokers and firemen, who appeared on deck and shouted their tribute to the Admiral.

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Presbyterian Assembly Sets Debt-Free Record

WINONA LAKE, Ind., May 23.—The Presbyterian General Assembly in session at Winona Lake to-day made good its promise of being the first debt-free assembly when the commission voted unanimously to add \$550,000 to the 1921-22 budget and to wipe out the church's long history of indebtedness on its \$1,000,000 pledge to the Inter-Church World Movement.

Divinity Students Assured Field for Bishop Cook Says World Is Weary of Turmoil and Hatred and Needs Aid of Strong and Sincere Men

Bishop Philip Cook, of Delaware, delivered the baccalaureate sermon last night at the General Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church, 179 Ninth Avenue, the sermon being the first of the commencement events at the seminary.

He said men entering the ministry now were doing so at a most auspicious time, the field for service being broad because the world was tired of turmoil, hatred and suffering. The service of strong and sincere men was needed everywhere, he said, pointing out that it was not the clergy only who served.

"We say that a minister who teaches God's truth from his pulpit does a Christian service," said Bishop Cook, "but he who teaches the truth in a classroom, or the judge who renders an honest decision, or, in fact, any man who does even the most menial honestly, does a consecrated service. A minister who baptizes a child does a Christian service, but so does the doctor or nurse who ministers to his physical needs."

To-day will be Alumni Day. The alumni essay will be read by the Rev. Dr. Philip Kreidler, of St. Luke's Church, Scranton, Pa. The alumni luncheon will be at 1 p. m. in the gymnasium, where there will be a reception by the faculty for alumni and other guests at 4 p. m.

Commencement exercises will take place to-morrow morning. The address will be delivered by the Rev. Dr. James Edwin W. Knickerbocker, of New York and Shanghai. The senior class luncheon will follow the commencement exercises.

Obituary GUSTAV AMBERG Gustav Amberg, seventy-nine years old, theatrical manager, died Sunday night at the St. Regis Hotel, where he had been confined since his illness connected with the Shubert theatrical enterprises at the time of his death. Mr. Amberg built the old Thalia Theater on the Bowery and was a director and manager of the Irving Place Theater.

DR. EDWIN W. KNICKERBOCKER Dr. Edwin W. Knickerbocker, life member of the New York Athletic Club and at one time a champion oarsman, died early yesterday morning at St. Luke's Hospital. He was sixty-two years old. He was a graduate of the College of the City of New York and the New York University School of Dentistry. The body is lying in state at the Campbell Funeral Church pending service arrangements. He had no relatives.

FLORA MACDONALD DENISON TORONTO, May 23.—Mrs. Flora Macdonald Denison, one of the Canadian Suffrage Association, widely known as a writer and lecturer, died at a friend's home here to-day. In recent years she had been seeking to perpetuate the memory of W. A. Whitman through the Whitman fellowship for Canada, which she founded.

EDSON SANFORD Edson Sanford, ninety-four years old, churchman, temperance advocate and veteran of the Civil War, died Saturday night at the residence of his son, 393 Gates street. Although in his ninety-fifth year, Mr. Sanford was a regular attendant at James M. E. Church, Reid Avenue and Monroe Street, until a few weeks ago.
