

Merely and I'll Tell All, Is Plea Of Stadtmuller

Convicted Brindell Lieutenant Offers Sensational Disclosures in Exchange for Moderate Sentence

Brother Conveys Proposal

Trial of Joseph Moran, Also Indicted in Building Graft, to Begin Tuesday

Robert Stadtmuller, who was convicted of extortion last Wednesday and who is a lieutenant of Robert Brindell, is making strenuous efforts through his brother, Robert Stadtmuller, to obtain a recommendation for clemency from the District Attorney's office when he appears for sentence before Supreme Court Justice McAvoy next Thursday.

It was learned yesterday that Robert Stadtmuller had visited many persons connected with the case in the interest of his brother, and is reported to have made sensational disclosures to the District Attorney if the District Attorney's office would recommend leniency. The understanding is that these disclosures would be made on the witness stand before the Lockwood committee or to the District Attorney in charge of the prosecution, all of course, depending on the discretion of the court.

There was some speculation yesterday as to the nature of these proffered revelations, the suggestion being offered in certain circles that the Lockwood committee would hardly be willing to listen to merely entertaining stories about the operations of Brindell, now in Sing Sing, or to any more labor testimony unless of vital importance.

The trial of Joseph Moran, one of Brindell's strong-arm men in the Dock Builders' Union, who was indicted with

the labor czar and Stadtmuller on the charge of extortion and coercion, comes up before Justice McAvoy Tuesday morning.

On the same morning the Lockwood committee will continue its inquiry into the financial phase of the housing situation, with another attack against the New York Fire Insurance Exchange, which Samuel Untermyer, chief counsel to the committee, has characterized as "the most despotic monopoly in the country."

The revelations in connection with this combine and the resulting added burdens, according to the evidence, it is placing on housing construction, have brought forth a deluge of appeals from the public, urging the committee to go to the bottom of the business. Mr. Untermyer said at Thursday's session that he had merely scratched the surface of the matter.

Two Thrown Into River When Barge Hits Launch

Freighter Picks Up Men on Way to Outing After Their Craft Overtakes

John Veal, of 305 West 144th Street, and James B. Davidson, of 368 East 166th Street, were thrown into the East River yesterday afternoon when a launch in which they were riding was struck by a freight barge off the foot of Fulton Street, Brooklyn.

The two men were on their way to Atlantic Highlands for a Memorial Day outing. They crossed from the Manhattan side of the river to give a wide berth to a freight car ferry. As they were passing the foot of Fulton Street they ran aground on a freight barge. The barge struck the launch near the bow. The launch was overturned and sank. A passing tugboat picked up the two men, who suffered no ill effects from the submersion. As the tugboat was making for the Brooklyn shore the launch came to the surface and the tugboat took it in tow.

Navy Flyer Killed, Aid Hurt
SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 28.—Lieutenant George T. Roe, of Boston, navy aviator, was killed and Chief Machinist's Mate James P. Dudley, of Virginia, was seriously injured when the airplane in which they were flying fell 500 feet and struck on North Island today.

Court Plans Speed And Uniformity in Liquor Law Cases

Justice Boarst, Coming From Up-state, Confers With District Attorney's Aids on Enforcement

Uniformity in the presenting and prosecution of liquor cases at the coming extraordinary term of the Supreme Court, was the object of a conference held yesterday at Amsterdam, N. Y., by Acting District Attorney Joab H. Banton, Assistant District Attorney Albert B. Unger and Justice Boarst, who is coming here from upstate to preside.

The attorneys and the jurist are seeking to arrange matters so that the court will be able to handle the cases with the utmost efficiency. Mr. Unger will confer Wednesday with Inspector McDonald, in charge of enforcement for the police, and pass on Judge Boarst's ideas regarding the most effective way of enforcing the law.

United States District Attorney Leroy Ross said yesterday that while county judges have reported that they cannot get a jury on Long Island to convict in a liquor case, the Federal courts have no such trouble. A conviction was obtained yesterday by Mr. Ross in the Federal District Court before Judge Frank Cooper. Michael McCormick, a bartender, employed in a Rockaway roadhouse, was convicted of selling liquor in violation of the Volstead law. Sentence will be imposed on Tuesday.

Thirty jugs of wine and two bottles of whisky taken by the police from the apartment of Aaron Reiser, a former saloon proprietor, of 1962 Pitkin Avenue, Brooklyn, were ordered returned to him yesterday by a jury in the Kings County Court, Judge Bayes presiding.

The police visited the apartment with a search warrant on April 27. They carried away the liquor, notwithstanding Reiser's protest that he was using the liquor only for himself and that he had purchased it prior to prohibition. The case was one of those considered by a grand jury, which failed to indict him. Reiser then started proceedings to get possession of the liquor, and demanded a jury trial.


