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Rural Byways To Rival White Ways of City

Constantly Increasing Night Traffic on Country Roads Makes Good Light Necessary, Chicagoans Told To Replace Manual Labor

Elimination of Gases and Smoke in Big Terminals by Electrification Planned

CHICAGO, June 3.—Development of electrical illumination in all its varied phases—lighting of homes, stores, offices, factories and streets—has progressed along scientific lines during the last year, according to the report to-day of the Lighting Sales Bureau of the Commercial section of the National Electric Light Association in session at the Drake Hotel.

Elimination of country highways in the next few months will be a step toward the goal of the Commonwealth Edison Company, Chicago, who submitted the report. "This new era of great interest not only to the rural dweller, but to every motorist with the increasing night traffic on our highways, there has been a more insistent demand for a lighting unit that will properly and economically light a country road.

Now comes a new epoch in street lighting, according to the report, which had its inception on the Pacific coast in 1915, when the first super-white light was used. It is known as "intense" or "super-white" light. These intensive white lights are made possible by standards eighteen or more feet in height, carrying two or three high power luminous arc or incandescent fixtures.
