

1,000 Police Guard Sims Here To-day

Olympic With Admiral on Board Reports From Sandy Hook; to Dock Early This Morning

Plans for a Mock Greeting Continue

Every Effort Is Promised to Keep Crowds From Heckling the Admiral

Orders for the posting of a thousand police in and about the White Star line piers, where the Olympic will dock this morning with Rear Admiral William S. Sims, and at the Pennsylvania Railroad station, where the Admiral is expected to entrain immediately for Washington, were issued yesterday by Police Commissioner Enright. The Commissioner said he did not expect any trouble, but that if any one is looking for it "he will get it."

Bogus Runner And \$50,000 in Bonds Vanish

Youth Forges Messenger's Slip and in Five Minutes After Broker Calls Him He Has Made Big Haul

The earl, who has lived peaceably on his 41,000-acre estate since he succeeded to the earldom in 1877, has been King's Lieutenant of County Cork since 1874.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The deadlock between the Senate and House over the naval appropriation bill was broken to-day by conferees with a virtual agreement to lop off about \$90,000,000 of the \$98,000,000 added to the bill by the Senate, and with the right of the House to vote directly on the Borah disarmament amendment. There are still many minor tangles to be cleared away, but the conferees were reported in substantial agreement on all major points.

Harvey Has Instructions to Feel Out Japanese in London Now in Connection With British Treaty

WASHINGTON, June 21.—President Harding will not call a disarmament conference for Great Britain, Japan and the United States in the immediate future. There will be no such call until there has been a thorough understanding and a very definite agreement made in secret between representatives of the three countries.

Senate Likely to Yield To Sharp Cut in Army

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Recommendations will be made by Chairman Wadsworth of the Senate Military Affairs Committee to-morrow that the Senate reduce from its amendments to the army appropriation bill, funds objectionable by the House conferees. Concurrence of the Senate in the recommendations is expected and the big appropriation bill will then practically be ready to be sent to the President.

Year's Hottest Day and 1921's First Heat Fatality

Yesterday was the hottest day of the year. At 5 o'clock in the afternoon the temperature was 88 degrees. One man died of heat prostration.

Report King Peter Dead

LONDON, June 21.—The weekly newspaper the Near East learns that King Peter of Serbia died three or four days ago. The Serbian Legation and the British Foreign Office deny any knowledge of King Peter's reported death.

France Is Going Slow
