French Mission Pays Respects At White House

President and Mrs. Harding Entertain Distinguished Visitors at Pleasant Summertime Reception Dinner Parties Popular

Many Notables Remain in Capital; Taft Family to Receive Cordial Welcome

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The Ambassador of France and Mme. Jusserand, with their distinguished countryman, Marshal Fayolle, one of the heroes of the World War, and the twelve other members of the French mission, some of them ladies, called on the President and Mrs. Harding immediately after their return from Haritan. The mission arrived in Washington Tuesday morning from Canada, where it went to thank the government for its participation in behalf of France during the World War, and the entire suite went direct to the French Embassy, where the Ambassador and Mme. Jusserand entertained them at luncheon, and where they remained until just before being received at the White House at 4 o'clock.

The reception in the Blue Room was a pretty sight, with the women in charming summer attire and Mrs. Harding in the center of the party wearing a mid-summer gown of white. There were flowers everywhere on the first floor, arranged primarily in honor of the return of the President and Mrs. Harding to the White House. The windows were all wide open and there was a charming atmosphere of coolness about the house which even on the warmest days is never uncomfortable.

Mrs. Field has a very charming personality that is very charming.
