Drop \$25,000 Bail For Rosenbluth in Cronkite Case

Marks Last Formality in Government's Decision Not to Prosecute Former Army Officer Demands Inquiry

The last formality in connection with the decision of the government not to prosecute Robert Rosenbluth, a former army captain, on the charge of killing Major Alexander Cronkite, took place yesterday when Judge Shepard dismissed the \$25,000 bail in which he had been held to await action of the grand jury which took place yesterday in the four months that have passed since his arrest. The discharge of bail in his case followed the receipt of information from the United States Attorney for the Western District of Washington that he would entertain no complaint against Rosenbluth.

tended to devote his energies to an endeavor to obtain a Congressional inquiry into the circumstances of his arrest and detention. "Only when I have drawn my last breath," he said, "will I cease to fight, not for personal vindication, but for the reestablishment of justice, so sadly ravaged in my case. It is unfortunately universally held that 'one can't buck system' and that it is futile to hope for real justice from the Department of that name. This, I hold, is a very dangerous state of affairs; subversive of public safety. I would be untrue to my ideals of public service and American citizenship should I acquiesce in this official wrongdoing. While it of course affects me more directly than any one else, nevertheless this attempt to commit murder through official channels affects vitally the 'liberty and pursuit of happiness' of every one of the 107,000,000 free and equal citizens of our country. I am sure that they will lend their moral aid and direct influence to have Congress investigate the matter and put a definite and final termination to a state of affairs whereby government officials, boasting of their security from counter action, because of the immunities which their positions provide, can recklessly and wantonly set out to destroy by their official life-work and reputation, and even threaten death penalty; and then not be held personally accountable therefor."

Stockholders Fight Over Closed Plant And One Is Shot

Dominick Paggalei, Worker in Co-operative Automobile Factory, May Die; Jose Aragonisi Is Held

A quarrel between two stockholders of the Scientific Automotive Corporation, a co-operative enterprise, in front of the corporation's plant at 178 Worth Street, resulted yesterday in the shooting of Dominick Paggalei, forty years old, of 829 Union Street, Brooklyn, by Jose Aragonisi, also forty-two, of 322 East 118th Street. The two men were workers in the plant. Paggalei was shot twice in the abdomen and is not expected to live. Aragonisi is locked up in the Elizabeth Street Station charged with felonious assault. The police version of the disagreement is that Paggalei had induced Aragonisi to take \$500 worth of stock in the automotive corporation, which is engaged in manufacturing a new automobile and which has been working on a co-operative basis of employing only men who buy stock. Two weeks ago the plant suspended operation and Aragonisi grew discontented with his investment.

If you don't, you suffer; if you do, you get your only chance to win. The foundation of your success, and your happiness is your health. An active brain handicapped by an ailing body can never render a good account of its talents. A sick man is of little use to himself. He is a constant care to his family and friends. You can't all be models of physical fitness, but there is a way to develop and expand your possibilities, and it rests absolutely with yourself. There is no secret to pass along, no trick involved, only a little common sense and the will to apply it. It is a matter of food. You reflect your diet. You are just what you eat. Nothing more, nothing less. If you own horses, you feed them for efficiency, and get it. If you run a battery of boilers you use the fuel that they properly consume. If you run an automobile you use the gas and oil and grease that keep the car rolling at its best. Do the same for yourself. And for your children. Remember this. You live in an age that has put a premium on refined foods. By refined foods I mean foods that have been made deficient in nutritive strength by having parts removed to make them more palatable or more inviting to the eye. At every meal you are eating badly balanced dishes, that absolutely do not provide the essentials to normal health. You go day after day on devitalized food, wear yourself to a frazzle and then turn to drugs to repair the waste. You expect your doctor to "fix you up." Then you go on with your "refined diet" as usual and blame the doctor for his failure to perform a miracle. You never gave him half a chance. Your diet is the result of years of habit. Its selection has been dictated by your taste, not by your intelligence. You are going to continue to eat "one-sided" foods. But your case is not hopeless. There is a way to correct this sort of diet. There is a way out of the thralldom of foods that don't nourish. Eat what you can digest and then balance it with milk. Your bread, your breakfast food, your cake lack many of the things your body must have. Milk provides in abundance what other foods lack. Milk is in reality a "Fountain of Youth." I know, I take my own medicine, and you, Mr. Business Man, will find your load lighter, your job pleasanter, your days brighter if you will give milk a chance to do its best for you.

First Real Action To Prevent Future Wars

The discouragement and pessimism of people the world over who thought all the bloodshed and suffering of the black years of war had brought nothing but heartache and taxes, seemed to turn again into hope a few days ago when President Harding sent out a call to the Great Powers for a disarmament conference, and they all agreed to come. Nation seemed to call to nation in the cable dispatches from London, Paris, Rome, Tokyo, and Berlin, telling of cheering parliaments and approving statesmen and leaders of opinion in the press rising to a world-circling chorus. "A start has actually been made" toward disarmament, and, the New York World notes, "the richest and most powerful of all countries has taken the first step. . . . Peoples staggering under an unbearable burden of taxation are not likely to support governmental quibbling and halting" now that the start has been made. "We are ready to discuss with American statesmen any proposal for the limitation of armaments which they wish to set out, and we can undertake that no such overtures will find lack of willingness on our part to meet them," declared Prime Minister Lloyd George. In Japan, former Minister of Justice Ozaki, touring the country for disarmament, declared on July 4th that such a conference as President Harding has now called would "surely be the beginning of a solution of all the diplomatic questions between Japan and the United States."
