Dr. Stone Gave Life in Effort To Save Wife

Purdue President Dropped to Death on Rocks as He Took Spouse From Crevice Into Which She Fell

Woman in Peril 3 Days Many Messages of Sympathy Received at University for Loss of Educator

Special Dispatch to The Tribune BANGF, Ind., July 27.—A story of heroism and death on a jagged mountain side and of a woman's struggle alone—almost within sight of the shattered body of her husband—against death by hunger, thirst and cold...

At the emergency hospital at Camp Assiniboia, to which Mrs. Stone was rushed after her discovery Sunday by a searching party, it was said she would recover. Physicians and nurses who were attending her said the fact that she had not perished from the shock of a deprivation of the ordeal was remarkable.

Fail to Reach Body Meanwhile little progress had been made toward locating the body of Dr. Stone, one of the best known geologists in the United States.

Politicians and Red Tape Blamed for School Conditions

National Committee Survey in 377 Cities Shows That Independent Boards Are Obtaining Best Results

Red tape and handicapping of boards of education by politicians are two of the main causes of the present "deplorable" condition of American public schools, according to a survey directed by the National Committee for Chamber of Commerce Cooperation With the Public Schools and the American City Bureau, made public yesterday.

The survey, which covered conditions in 377 cities, showed that where boards of education were "independent" or "free from political manipulation and control, the most efficient administrative and educational results were obtained.
