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K. of C. Plans Record Correspondence School

Largest Institute of Kind in World to Aid Former Service Men

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—Decision to establish the largest correspondence school in the United States was reached at the opening session of the Knights of Columbus here to-day.

The system will have its headquarters in the new building the Knights of Columbus are erecting in New Haven, Conn.

It will cost approximately \$2,000,000 to establish and will call for a first year enrollment of 100,000 students.

No limit will be placed upon the number of former service men seeking enrollment in this correspondence school.

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Cuba to Protest Fordney Sugar and Tobacco Rates

HAVANA, Aug. 2.—Cuba will send a special delegation to Washington to appear before the Senate Finance Committee in opposition to the sugar and tobacco provisions of the Fordney tariff bill, according to an official statement issued at the National Palace.

The delegation will be accompanied by Sebastian Gelabert, Secretary of the Treasury, who will set also a special envoy in an effort to obtain a \$50,000,000 loan in the United States to help the principal Cuban industries over the present depression.
