

Scores Flee Fire On River Hebert, In Nova Scotia

Many Villages Wiped Out; Rains Check Peril in Maine; Escanaba Is Believed Safe

SPRING HILL MINES, N. S., Aug. 7.—Numerous isolated dwellings and small settlements lying between the River Hebert, on the shore of Chignecto Bay, and Oxford are believed to have been wiped out by a forest fire which was sweeping that section to-night. Driven by a forty-mile wind, the blaze spread over nearly one hundred square miles of territory, and scores of persons in its path have been forced to flee for their lives.

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 7.—Heavy rain to-day and to-night checked the forest fires which for several days had been devastating woodland and threatening villages in various parts of the State. The rain started this forenoon in Penobscot County, where firemen and volunteers struggled throughout yesterday and last night to save the village of Howland, north of Bangor, in Franklin County, western Maine, where the flames had been approaching the village of Oquossoc in the Rangeley Lakes region, the townpiper did not begin until this evening.

ESCANABA, Mich., Aug. 7.—Forest fires which have been burning in this vicinity for several weeks, slackened during the last twenty-four hours and fears felt for the safety of Escanaba have lessened.

Additional reports of fire damage were received here to-day, two farms being in the pathway of the flames, suffering principally through the loss of several thousand dollars worth of timber last night.

Volunteer fighting forces in the surrounding territory to-day reported progress in checking the flames, but it was said their work is being handicapped by high winds.

Building Loans Still Available Through East

Report That Great Lending Institutions Were Out of Market Declared Untrue; Money More Plentiful


