

Girl Killed, 3 Hurt in Collapse Of Hotel Roof

Twenty-Ton Concrete Slab Crashes Into the Kitchen of Marlborough-Blenheim at Atlantic City at Lunch Waitress, 22, Is Victim

Other Noises Avert Panic Among Guests in Dining-Room at Time of Accident

Special Dispatch to The Tribune ATLANTIC CITY, Aug. 9.—One waitress was killed, another was seriously injured and two pantries were badly hurt this afternoon, when a twenty-ton slab of concrete forming part of the roof and wall of a kitchen of the Marlborough-Blenheim Hotel collapsed.

The dead girl is Evelyn Brigham, twenty-two years old, of Cherry Chase, Md. The injured waitress is Gertrude McCarthy. She suffered internal injuries and a deep gash across her head.

The other victims were Joseph Brown and Levi Winder, pantries. Brown was said at the hospital to-night that the recovery of Miss McCarthy was doubtful.

Miss Brigham was a normal school student and was carrying on her studies through college by working here during the summer season.

The noise of two large steam derricks, working on the Ohio Avenue side of the kitchen, drowned out the crash, thereby averting a panic among the hotel guests, who were filling into the dining-room.

Girl Instantly Killed The spot where the accident occurred is used for the serving of sea food and crushed ice to waitresses carrying orders into the dining-room.

The crash of the falling slab was accomplished by the clatter of falling trays and dishes, dropped by terrified waitresses as they scurried for safety.

The kitchen was immediately filled with a suffocating cloud of dust, penetrating every corner, and it was not for several minutes that employees were able to go to the rescue of the victims.

Several men worked strenuously in extricating the bodies of Miss Brigham, only to discover that she had been instantly killed.

Kitchen Filled With Brick The hole in the wall caused by the cave-in was wide enough for two automobiles to drive through.

Two explanations were given for the crash, but they, at best, are only theories. Judge John J. White, head of the Marlborough-Blenheim Company.

A coroner's inquest will be held.

Jack Unmasked as Madcap Jill After Wooing Girl Two Years

Gentle-Faced Farmer Who Always Had Excuses Ready When Asked to Name Wedding Day Vanished Into Skirts, "Sweetheart" Charges

For two years Mary Holdowanetz, twenty-two years old, and now living at 2178 Lexington Avenue, loved a gentle youth. He was dark and slender and soft of voice.

He proposed to her a week after they met. They went to dances together. They walked in the moonlight, after the fashion of lovers.

It transpired, according to the girl, that "he" was not a gentleman at all. In fact, she says, "he" was nothing more nor less than a pretty, slender girl of five feet eight, with dark brown hair and eyes, who successfully fooled Mary for two years, as well as three farmhands who worked beside "him."

Miss Holdowanetz appeared before Assistant District Attorney Alexander Lehman in Harlem court yesterday and asked for a summons to bring into court the youth who had humiliated her.

She said that "Jack Brown's" real name was Carolyn Schick, that she lived in Kingston, N. Y., and that she is at present with her parents in Monticello. The authorities said they could not issue the summons unless Carolyn came to New York City.

Miss Holdowanetz returned from court yesterday to the restaurant at 2178 Lexington Avenue, where she is a waitress, and was there found by her employers. She told her story with much indignation.

The girl is sweet and wholesome looking, with blue eyes and dark hair. Two years ago, she says, she went to Kingston to work in a restaurant, and shortly afterward the alleged "Jack Brown" arrived on a neighboring farm.

Watchman Killed In Brooklyn Battle With Cracksmen

Murderers Flee Without Obtaining Any Loot After Breaking Handle and Part of Lock of Basement Safe

John Schnackenberg, sixty years old, a watchman, was murdered early yesterday just after he had rung an electric time clock in the basement of the main store of H. C. Bohack & Co., at 1291 Broadway, Brooklyn.

The body was found an hour later lying face down with hands and feet tied together.

There was evidence that Schnackenberg had struggled desperately with his slayers before he was killed with an iron bar. Robbery undoubtedly was the motive, according to the police, but the murderers failed to open a safe despite the fact they had succeeded in breaking off the handle of its door and part of the lock.

The crime was discovered when an agency sent an employee to find why Schnackenberg had not rung in according to schedule. Patrolmen Hildebrand and Eichhorn entered the store and found the body.

Nurse Who Slew Kinkead Is Ready to Plead Insanity

The hearing of Olivia M. P. Stone, a nurse who last Friday shot and killed Ellis Guy Kinkead, a Cincinnati lawyer, was postponed a second time yesterday in Brooklyn at the request of Assistant District Attorney Gallagher, who said the prosecution would not be ready.

The prisoner was attired in the apparel she wore at the time of the shooting. Her dress, which was of brown silk, was rumpled, and spotted from weeping, and wringing her hands constantly. She has declared she was Kinkead's common-law wife.

"She did not realize what she was doing that night, nor did she realize it for two days," he declared. "Now she realizes the seriousness of her situation."

Farrar Charge He Abhors Toil Stirs Tellegen

"Don Juan" is to be produced by Frank Reicher in conjunction with the Selwyns. When we engaged Mr. Tellegen for the title role there was no indication of any trouble between the actor and his wife.

"I am sorry to say what I have to. Will you please send me the ring with the name Schick, because Mr. Tellegen took it away from my father and he got it from his best friend, please send it. I am sorry. Hope this will reach you in the best of health.

Mr. Tellegen was indignant when his wife's side of the case, as published this morning, was told him. He does not read the newspaper accounts of his affairs. He authorized me to make a general denial for him.

Neither Harry A. Steinfield, for the actor, nor Alvin Untermyer, for the diva, would disclose the grounds in the litigation, but Untermyer said that the divorce action and counter-claim were brought in New York.

The marvelous uprising of the people to do honor to the Singer of Songs is a sign that the world has not gone entirely mad with the horrors of war.


The honors paid to Caruso in his own land, and by its nobility, show how deeply the people value music and its teachers.
