

**Collins Quits  
Murphy Slate  
To Aid Talley**

**Declines Designation for  
General Sessions Bench  
to Make Room for Judge  
Rejected by Tammany**

**Hines Assails the Boss**

**In Letter to District Lead-  
ers He Likens the Chief-  
tain to Simon Legree**

Justice Cornelius F. Collins, of the Children's Court, as predicted for the last three days, yesterday sent a letter to Edward F. Boyle, chairman of the Tammany executive committee, declining the designation of the organization for judge of the Court of General Sessions.

This clears the way for substituting Judge Alfred J. Talley, now on the General Sessions bench, whose removal by Charles F. Murphy on August 10 caused a storm of protest from the friends of Judge Talley and again raised the issue of interference with judges that proved so disastrous to Tammany last year, when Justice Newburger was discarded by Tammany only to be taken up by the Republicans and independents.

It is understood in Tammany circles that Justice Collins, because of his withdrawal to help Murphy out of his dilemma, is scheduled for nomination as justice of the Supreme Court next fall. In the event of Mayor Hylan's reelection, Justice Collins may be appointed Corporation Counsel. He was for years an assistant in the city's Law Department.

**Collins's Letter of Withdrawal**

Justice Collins's letter, taking himself off the Tammany ticket, follows:

Dear Judge: I have decided to decline the recommendation for designation for justice of the Court of General Sessions, and am filing my formal declination. I wish to assure you and your associates on the executive committee of my sincere appreciation of the honor conferred upon me in recommending me for designation for that office.

In view, however, of such important work still unfinished in the Children's Court and of many important questions about to arise in connection with changes in duties and jurisdiction of the court of which I am now a member, I feel it my duty to continue to act in my present capacity for the time at least.

I am pleased to see complete harmony among the real, earnest Democrats of our city. Opponents of the party and of the best interests of the city have attempted falsely and maliciously, but without result, to create an impression of disaffection. I am pleased to see their efforts are in vain.

With the best wishes for your personal success and the success of the entire ticket, I am, yours faithfully,

**Retirement Under Pressure Surprise**

From the Tammany point of view, the surrender by Justice Collins of this designation is a big loss to the ticket. If he had remained on the ticket and been elected his term would have been fourteen years, at \$15,000 a year. While his designation was a great surprise, his withdrawal under pressure is equally a surprise, and the friends of the judge and of his brother, Alderman William T. Collins, will be rather impatient until the organization makes good the loss to Judge Collins.

There is little doubt that Judge Talley's name will be placed on the ticket. Judge Collins has made it clear to Murphy and other members of the Tammany executive committee that he is withdrawing for the benefit of Judge Talley, his long-time friend.

The Talley-Collins incident is interpreted, both in and out of Tammany Hall, as proof that Murphy is stepping very carefully so as to avoid a repetition of the defeat he sustained two years ago, when Major Curran and Mayor La Guardia carried the city and Manhattan Borough.

**May Be Lesson for Boss**

Probably the Tammany boss never again will delegate to a sub-committee of men and women the delicate task of bringing in a nomination slate. He has his alibi this time, on the ground that the special committee on nominations dropped Judge Talley. This defense was not accepted by any one, as the assumption was that Murphy himself directed the selection of the names reported by the special committee. Because the result of the experiment was bad, the Murphy men will go back to the old method of choosing candidates in secret session, and then have them approved by the executive and general committees.

James J. Hines, the anti-Murphy district leader of Harlem, yesterday sent to all district leaders a statement outlining his candidacy for President of the Borough of Manhattan against ex-Senator Julius Miller, assuring the district leaders that he is not opposed to political leaders as such, but that he is unalterably opposed to arrogant bosses, who are not in touch with the rank and file of the party.

"It is not uncommon for Murphy to say," says Hines in his letter to the leaders, "that the primaries are open to everybody, but if any ambitious Democrat takes this statement seriously and enters the primaries which Murphy says are open he will find that the only thing 'open' about it is an open grave for his political aspirations."

**Ex-Service Men Turned Down**

Hines refers to his business differences with Murphy in 1918 and says that he does not believe that private business affairs should interfere with political relations. "For there is no doubt that any number of business men use the same political ticket. But it is evident that Charles F. Murphy holds a different view, for when our business differences arose he carried the matter into our political relations."


That he could not obtain employment for any of his military comrades after the war without the sanction of the boss is another reminder that Major Hines has sent to the leaders. He recalls that many of those in the service with him had been turned down because of his support, and Murphy's game of freeze-out was such that he could not obtain a job for a per diem laborer. Many a leader close to Murphy, says Hines, "is forced to submit to the lash of 'Simon Legree' Murphy, and to all intents and purposes he becomes 'poor Uncle Tom' and swallows his pride because he does not want to injure his constituents—that's why so many of them do not revolt."

Once the Murphy system is destroyed, says Hines, and the boss is bowled over, Murphy will never spring up again, and on the night of September 13, he declares, Murphy will know that the Democrats want him to get out.


