

Mrs. Mallory Beats Miss Browne and Wins U. S. Tennis Championships for Sixth Time

New York Defender Conquers Californian After Poor Start

Norway Native Rallies After Dropping First Set, 4-6, and Pulls Out Victory by 6-4, 6-2 in the Final Match of Forest Hills Tourney

This country has had no such record of repeated victories in the struggle for the championship as Mrs. Mallory has.

The two were sitting among the spectators at the West Side club yesterday when Mrs. Mallory was told that she was the superior brand of tennis, who declared that the title player from the Pacific showed the greatest fitness and need the better judgment in her battle for the title.

Miss Browne's Brilliance. The national champion withstood every variation of tactics that Miss Browne brought into play, and then, when the crucial moments of the match arrived, proved her courage and her skill by maintaining her own height and center of gravity.

Both players were kept on the run almost continually by the accuracy of the other's placement shots. Mrs. Mallory thrilled the gallery by some of her astounding "let" balls that forced her wide of the court as she fairly hurled herself at them.

Mrs. Mallory was forced to the same extreme by the accuracy of her opponent's returns, but the champion called upon her superb speed of foot and her remarkable powers of endurance to keep her in the battle, and she did not fail in the end.

At the finish of the match, as Mrs. Browne walked off to the clubhouse, she was greeted by a tremendous burst of applause. Indeed, she might have thought that it was the end of the world, for she realized that it was the end of her career as a tennis player.

After E. C. Godwin had taken his place in the high chair of the umpire and Jennings occupied the adjoining chair, Mrs. Mallory and Miss Browne tossed a request for choice of knees and the champion won. She won the match on her own delivery, ending with a smashing placement shot as she drove down the side line.

Mrs. Browne did not take long to prove that she is not to be taken for granted. She won the next three games in a row, smothering her opponent's returns by staying on the net and bringing off sharp volleying shots for the corners of the court.

There are few women playing the tennis game in this country who are not well known to the tennis public. Mrs. Mallory's victory is a record that will be remembered for many years.

When the champion was forcing the challenge in the first half of the match by stalling, she struck within a foot or two of the base line.

Miss Browne continued to batter at her opponent's backhand, and she was winning by this attack, for Mrs. Mallory, generally caught out of position as the ball hit her backhand, was not getting any better.
