 CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Charles W. French and six of his aids, arrested several days ago in a Federal raid on French headquarters at the Hotel La Salle, were arraigned today before Judge E. Glass, United States Commissioner, on a technical charge of using the mails to defraud. They were held in lieu of bail on bonds of \$50,000 each, the others on bonds of \$30,000.

It is alleged by the Department of Justice and the District Attorneys as represented by John V. Cinnin, First Assistant District Attorney, that French and his party have been instrumental, with John W. Worthington, an engineering millionaire of dollars worth a stack and bond swindlers.

Evidence From Ohio

John W. Sawyer, a Department of Justice operative from Cleveland, arrived in Chicago this afternoon and went immediately into conference with Colonel Cinnin. Sawyer brought to Chicago with him \$10,000,000 in notes signed by the Ideal Tire and Rubber Company, and a list of thirty Ohio concerns from which it is alleged the French outfit had collected \$20,000,000.

While an investigation is to be made to determine the validity of these notes, the Department of Justice operative began investigation to discover if the notes were genuine.

In Lake Harriet, near Minneapolis, was

found a man named yesterday. The body was identified earlier as that of A. E. Roberts, an alleged agent of French in the twin cities.

These arraigned here with French were Charles Henicke, J. H. Leet, Alva W. Harshman, Rudolph E. Kohn, J. H. Strobel and Charles H. Hawkins. Mrs. Hawkins was taken in custody with her husband in the hotel raid, but was permitted to sign her own bond because of illness of her mother. Alleged confessions by Kohn and Harshman, secretary to French, are responsible for uncovering many details of the French outfit's work.

French Warns Associate

In the United States Marshal's office French met Henicke and Leet for the first time since they were arrested. "When we are through with the Commissioner," French said to them in a low tone of voice, "and are taken down before Judge Landis, he might care what you say—don't talk too much."

The French arraignment was halted for a while to take up the case of J. Laura Thomas, arrested a few days ago on a \$3,000 stock swindle charge, thought for a while to have been connected with the French outfit. Thomas denied any knowledge of French or his associates, and insisted that he was local representative of a reputable concern.

As the Chicago party was being

arranged, dispatches from Milwaukee announced that A. A. Streifen, a banker, had been arrested three days ago, had been arraigned and released on \$10,000 bond.
