



Candidate Accuses Republican Up-State Leaders of Connivance With Local Democratic Clique

Election Bureau Cited
Abolition of Office Held Significant; Haskell Assails Hylan and Police

Judge Reuben L. Haskell and one of his insurgent rivals for the Republican Mayoralty nomination, E. H. La Guardia, toured Manhattan and the Bronx last night, speaking before several Republican district organizations.

La Guardia continued his attacks on Governor Miller, emphasizing home rule as the issue of the campaign; charged that the agreement entered into between certain up-state Republican leaders and New York City Democrats, and observed it was significant that the office of the State Superintendent of Elections is an agency of government to insure an honest election in this city, was abolished by Governor Miller on the eve of a municipal campaign.

Haskell, however, is not alone could beat Hylan. "Haskell, Bennett, four years ago, after winning the Republican nomination, ran fourth in the general election, he cannot hope to defeat Hylan, even if nominating Hylan as his opponent, he will not take more than five minutes to deliver."

MeInness Silent on Charge He Votes in New Rochelle
Hamilton MeInness, insurgent candidate for the Republican nomination for Borough President of Brooklyn, was silent yesterday regarding the charge made by George W. Baker, Jr., son of the organization candidate for Borough President, George W. Baker, that he was an enrolled voter of New Rochelle and had voted in New Rochelle last year.

MeInness evaded the charge in a statement which he issued in reply, saying that he was a bona fide resident of Brooklyn and had voted there for ten years, was born and educated in Brooklyn, married there, and that a daughter was born to him there. He insisted that he merely had a summer residence in New Rochelle.

MeInness, however, made no mention of where he voted last year, nor did he deny the charge that he had voted in Westchester County last year.
