

Bares Ship Plot Taking Millions In Alcohol Tax

Special Treasury Agent Declares Permits for Foreign Consignments Have Been Obtained by Fraud

Cargoes Seem to Vanish

Scheme Is Said to Include Scuttling of Old Vessels Used in the Traffic

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 30.—Evidence of a gigantic plot to swindle the government out of millions of dollars in revenue taxes in the shipment of large quantities of alcohol through the ports of New York and Philadelphia has been unearthed by Nicholas C. Brooks, special agent of the Treasury Department here, and laid before the Federal Prohibition Commissioner in Washington. Brooks revealed that three weeks ago shipment of 120,000 gallons of alcohol was sent through Philadelphia to a port in Greece. It is charged that the shipper undertook to use a schooner. That vessel is reported to have been scuttled in Boston, and customs officers literally forced the shippers to load the alcohol on a big liner of a reputable steamship company, Brooks said. He added that the Reichsbank had been compelled to take from its gold reserves 68,000,000 marks in gold dollars and other foreign moneys, which are now on the way to New York.

to disperse and retire peacefully to their respective homes within a limited time. "Now, therefore, I, Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, do hereby make proclamation and I hereby command all persons engaged in the strike to disperse and retire peacefully to their respective homes on or before 12 o'clock noon of the 1st day of September, 1921, and hereafter abandon said combinations and submit themselves to the laws and constituted authorities of said state. "I invoke the aid and cooperation of all good citizens to uphold the law and preserve the public peace. "In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. "Done at the City of Washington, this 30th day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and forty-sixth."

Two Regiments Held in Readiness

Coincident with the issuance of the proclamation, Major General Shanks, commanding the troops at Camp Dix, was directed to hold in readiness one regiment of infantry, comprising 1,000 officers and men, for immediate dispatch to West Virginia. The 19th Regiment of Infantry, commanded by Major General George W. Read, has been under similar instructions for several days. If troops are ordered into the state they will go immediately to the scene of the disturbances and remain until order is restored. The movement of troops can be completed within twenty-four hours.

Regiment at Camp Dix Ordered Ready for Duty

CAMP DIX, N. J., Aug. 30.—Orders were received from Washington to-day by the 26th Regiment of the 1st Division, in camp here, to prepare immediately for field duty. While the orders contained no specific instructions, officers at the camp expressed the belief that the regiment would be held in readiness for duty in the mining fields of West Virginia.

Mrs. Feldman, on the other hand, is suing for a separation on the ground of cruelty, charging particularly that her husband told her his salary was \$20,000 a year, when it was only \$4,000.

Plans to Distribute Proclamation to Miners

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Aug. 30.—President Harding's proclamation calling upon the armed bands in Boone County and the county of Logan to disband by noon Thursday under threat of martial law, will be distributed in the camps of the men by airplane through the cooperative efforts of Governor Morgan and Sheriff Chain of Logan County, the Governor announced to-night.


