Improved Financial Results Due Almost Entirely to Industrial Circumstances, Says "Railway Age"

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Shoe Men Ask Court To Restrain Employees

Say Sitchers' Union Control Hiring and Firing of Labor

LYNN, Mass., Sept. 9.—Twenty shoe manufacturers to-day filed bills in equity in the Supreme Court alleging that officers and members of the United Shoe Workers' union and the United Shoe Workers' Industrial Union conspired to take control of the hiring and retention of help in the stitching department. The bills seek to restrain the defendants from continuing certain unfair practices which the court alleged have resulted in the control of employment and factory production by the unions.
