"Blue Boy" Picture Reported Sold to Henry Huntington

Sir Joseph Duveen, Here on Visit, Denies Famous Painting Has Changed Hands; \$640,000 Purchase Price

From The Tribune's European Bureau LONDON, Nov. 11.—Henry E. Huntington, of New York, a director of the Southern Pacific Railroad, has become the owner of Gainsborough's famous picture "The Blue Boy," at a price of \$640,000, according to a report current here to-day.

This picture, with Reynolds's "Tragic Muse," was recently bought by Sir Joseph Duveen from the Duke of Westminster's collection for \$1,000,000. Mr. Huntington finally concluded the deal after a wireless search for Duveen, who was found abroad the Olympic in mid-Atlantic. The picture remains in London for some weeks before it will be shipped to America.

It is reported that Duveen is negotiating with the Duke of Westminster to purchase another famous picture. Sir Joseph Duveen died last night at his apartment in the Plaza Hotel at Gainsborough's "The Blue Boy," when he was sold to Mr. Huntington.

When asked to verify the reports of the sale of this picture Sir Joseph said: "It's all wrong. The painting has not been sold to Mr. Huntington. At present it is being exhibited in the National Gallery, London. From there it will be taken to Paris for exhibition. If I am unable to sell it in England I may bring it over here."

Sir Joseph intimated that he had no prospective purchaser for the famous picture. Mr. Huntington, who is reported to have purchased "The Blue Boy," has collected many fine paintings and is the possessor of one of the finest libraries in the world. His New York residence is at 2 East Fifty-seventh Street. In 1916 Mr. Huntington introduced into America Lewis & Simmons, art dealers, for \$100,000 for selling him a bogus Romney and won his case. The painting, a portrait of Mrs. Siddons, is the same which Sir Joseph Duveen bought for \$100,000 from the same dealer.

Among Mr. Huntington's sensational book purchases have been the E. D. Church collection of Americana for \$1,300,000; the Beverly Chew collection of English authors for \$500,000 and the famous Gutenberg Bible of the Hoe library for \$50,000. It is known that he is already spending \$100,000 on the work of Humphrey.

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\$113,935 Proceeds Of Day's Sale of Period Furniture

Several Hundred Persons at Second Session of Disposal of de Souhambi Collection; Six Chairs Bring \$7,650

Several hundred persons attended the second session of the sale of the Henri S. de Souhambi collection at the American Art Galleries yesterday, when some of the rarest period furniture ever assembled in this country was auctioned for a total of \$113,935. The objects represented the collections of eighteen years made from historic French chateaux and purchases from some of the finest European collections, including those of the Comte de Gontaut Biron, Comte de Gault, Comte de Bourbon Bussat, Duchesse de la Rochefoucauld, Comte de Gasquet, Prince de Condé, Comte de Franceville and others.

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Daniel Tredwell, Oldest Brooklyn Attorney, Dead

Originator of Title Insurance Business; Also Won Prominence in Field of Poetry

Daniel M. Tredwell, ninety-six years old, the oldest lawyer in Brooklyn, and originator of the title insurance business, died last Thursday at his residence, 546 Carlton Avenue, Brooklyn. Mr. Tredwell was born in Hempstead, L. I., and moved to Brooklyn when he began practicing law in 1848. He was a poet of some distinction, having published his first book of poems soon after his removal to Brooklyn. He was on the writing staff of "The Brooklyn Daily Freeman," published many years ago by Walt Whitman. Up to the time of his death Mr. Tredwell was associated with the Home Title Insurance Company, and was at one time president of the United States Title Company. In 1912, Mr. Tredwell issued a volume of sketches entitled "Personal Reminiscences of Men and Things in Long Island."

Mr. Tredwell was survived by one daughter, Mrs. Ida Tredwell Butler James, 1912 R. Funeral services will be held at the residence to-day at 3 o'clock. Interment will be at Hempstead, L. I.

Father Zahm Dead; Aided Roosevelt in South America

Catholic Scientist, Writer and Traveler Widely Known Here and Abroad as an Advanced Evolutionist

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Father John A. Zahm, C. S. C., who accompanied the late Theodore Roosevelt on his trip through the South American wilderness, died to-day in Munich, according to a cablegram received here by his brother, Dr. Albert Zahm.

Father Zahm was born in New Lexington, Ohio, June 14, 1851, the son of Jacob M. and Mary Bradock Zahm. He was educated at Notre Dame University, was graduated in 1870, and then entered the Order of the Holy Cross. He was appointed in charge of Notre Dame's scientific department in 1874, and was for years curator of the Notre Dame museum.

He was best known as an advanced evolutionist and devoted many years to a study of South America. Under pseudonyms he wrote "The Conquistadores Up the Orinoco and Down the Magdalena," "Following the Conquistadores Along the Andes and Down the Amazon," and "Women in Science." Under the name of J. A. Zahm he wrote "The Quest of Eldorado" and "The Great Insipiers."

He was the author of a number of important works under his own name among them being "Evolution and Dogma," "Bible Science and Faith" and "Catholic Science and Catholic Scientists." He lectured extensively throughout the United States, appearing at many schools and universities. He was a member of the Societe Francaise de Physique, Paris, the Societe Scientifique, Brussels, and the Dante Society of Florence. He traveled in many countries.

Wiltzie, a Brooklyn insurance broker who died Thursday, took place last evening at the home of his sister, Mrs. Laura Wiltzie Lake, 539 Eighty-first Street, Brooklyn. Interment will be at the keepie to-day. Mr. Wiltzie was a member of Newport Lodge, F. and A. M. He was known in musical circles as a frequent singer in Brooklyn churches.

COMMODORE E. P. BERTHOFF Commodore E. P. Berthoff, former commandant of the United States coast guard and widely known in naval and shipping circles, died early yesterday at Breton Hall Hotel, where he had made his home for a number of years. He was fifty-six years old.
